Obituaries

PIONEER DRUGGIST
DIED SATURDAY

Frederick A. Jackson, well-known druggist here for 40 years, died on Saturday evening at the Royal Jubilee Hospital, where he had been a patient for the last six months.

Mr. Jackson was born in Victoria on March 29, 1870, and was the eldest surviving son of the late Dr. William Jackson and Mrs. Jackson, pioneer residents of this city. He received his education in this city, and entered into the drug business with his brother, and conducted the business on Douglas Street for nearly 40 years. He made his home at 619 Avalon Road.

Mr. Jackson in his early days was well known in amateur sporting circles being connected with the J.B.A.A. rowing in the four-oared crew and taking part in regattas at Vancouver, Portland and Kamloops, often being in the

winning crew. He was also an enthusiastic baseball player being on the original Amity baseball team, where he starred as pitcher in 1888.

On retiring from the drug business Mr. Jackson spent most of his time at his summer home on the Saanich Inlet where he indulged in his love of fishing and gardening.

His wife predeceased him in 1923 and he is survived by his daughter, Mrs. H. J. Greenaway, and a son, W. H. (Haley) Jackson, both of Vancouver, two granddaughters and several nieces and nephews, and one brother, Richard Jackson, Deep Cove, V.I.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2.15 from Hayward's B.C. Funeral Chapel, Canon F. A. P. Chadwick will officiate and interment will be in Ross Bay Cemetery.

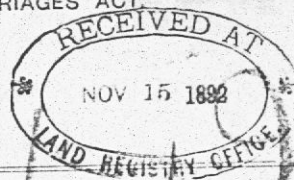

William Lorimer Passes Away Day After Daughter's Death

The death occurred at the Jubilee Hospital, yesterday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, of William Lorimer, one of Victoria's well-known and most respected residents. Deceased had only been ill a week, having suffered from an attack of pneumonia, followed by a stroke of paralysis last Thursday, from which he failed to recover.

A sad circumstance in connection with Mr. Lorimer's death is that he was only on Saturday bereaved by the loss of his youngest daughter. He had hoped to live long enough to greet his three sons, Robert, Walter and Sam on their return from service overseas.

Mrs. F. S. Widdowson and Mrs. F. A. Jackson are daughters of the deceased, and there are two other sons here, William A. Lorimer and James Lorimer. A grandson, Haley Jackson, is at present serving overseas, and deceased leaves eight other grandchildren.

Born at Uddingston, near Glasgow, on February 20, 1846, the late William Lorimer came to Victoria in the spring of the year 1870, leaving shortly afterward for Nanaimo for the purpose of building the trail from Nanaimo to Alberni, which has since become one of the most popular highways of Vancouver Island.

On completion of this work he returned to Victoria and his home has been in this city ever since. For a long time he was foreman pattern maker for the Albion Iron Works. Later he engaged in the contracting business, and among the buildings which he erected were the Dallas Hotel, and the Exhibition buildings at the Willows, the latter having burned down some years ago.

Having great faith in the mineral resources of Vancouver Island, Mr. Lorimer was interested to a large extent in the mining industry, and personally engaged in prospecting and developing properties. He located a number of claims on Banks Island and more recently had taken over a lease of the Sarita Iron mine on the West Coast, and was preparing to operate it when assailed by illness.

Mr. Lorimer was one of the originators of the Caledonian Society in Victoria and was a staunch supporter of all sports and games. In his younger days he showed a preference for bowling, in which game he was known as an expert. Mr. Lorimer resided at 576 Toronto Street.

A double funeral will take place at 3:15 to-morrow afternoon when services will be held at the B. C. Funeral Chapel over the remains of father and daughter. Interment will be made in the family plot in Ross Bay Cemetery.

PASSES TO LONG REST

Calcutt Nov 26, 1918
Well-known Contractor and Mining Man—Will be Buried With Daughter Today

Mr. William Lorimer, one of the best known residents of this city, died on Sunday afternoon at the Royal Jubilee Hospital from paralysis following pneumonia, having been ill a week.

A native of Uddingston, near Glasgow, he came to Victoria in 1870, being then a young man of 24. For many years he was foreman patternmaker for the Albion Stove Works, later becoming a contractor and builder, erecting the Dallas Hotel and the Exhibition Buildings at the Willows, which were destroyed by fire some years ago.

Mr. Lorimer was an enthusiastic advocate of the exploitation of the mineral resources of the Island and had actively engaged in prospecting and developing many promising properties, being engaged on the development of the Sarita Iron Mine at the time he was taken ill.

A strong supporter of sports and athletics, Mr. Lorimer was closely connected for many years with the old Caledonian Society, of which he was one of the originators. His home was at 576 Toronto Street, where he resided with his youngest daughter, who predeceased him by a day. He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. F. S. Widdowson and Mrs. F. A. Jackson, five sons, William A. and James, of this city, and Robert, Walter and Sam on service overseas. A grandson, Haley Jackson, is also serving overseas. There are eight other grandchildren.

A double funeral of father and daughter will take place at 3:15 o'clock today from the B.C. Funeral Chapel to Ross Bay Cemetery.

WILLIAM JACKSON

Well-known Resident Dies at Breakfast Table

With tragic suddenness death came this morning to William Jackson, the well-known druggist of Douglas and Pandora streets, who collapsed at his home, 1922 Blanshard Street, just after rising.

The cause and nature of the occurrence lies in the fact that his wife is at present in Portland, tending her sick daughter, Mrs. MacNair.

William Jackson was born in London, England, on April 5, 1861. He came to Canada when three years of age with his mother on a small vessel, via the Horn, joining his father, who preceded them to this city in 1861. After receiving his education at the public and high schools he studied chemistry with his father, a medical man, who was one of the pioneer druggists and medical men of the city, with a store on Government Street on the site afterward occupied by Dixie H. Ross & Co. The late Mr. Jackson also died suddenly of syncope, and after his father's death Mr. Jackson took over the business with his brother, Frederick Jackson, of this city.

Besides being prominent in business community, the late Mr. Jackson was a leading official in several fraternal orders. For many years he was financial secretary in Columbia Lodge No. 2, I. O. O. F., and also held a similar office in Vancouver Lodge No. 5, A. O. U. W.

He leaves to mourn his loss four daughters: Mrs. Joad, of Victoria; Mrs. MacNair, of Portland; Miss Lily Jackson, of Portland, and Mrs. H. Slade, of Sidney. His brothers are Frederick Jackson in the pharmacy business in this city and Richard Jackson, of Deep Cove, Saanich.

The remains are reposing at the B. C. Funeral Chapel and funeral announcements will be made later.

While still a very young dancer she had the distinction of being chosen to replace a child actress who had taken ill. This was the occasion of the showing of "Madame Butterfly" by the Lombardi Opera from Italy in the old Victoria Opera House. This was Mona's first theatrical performance and it lasted a week. She was filled with pride to have her parents watching from the red plush boxes in the front of the hall.

In 1924 came a great thrill when Mona was crowned May Queen by Mayor Reginald Hayward, and she rode in the Victoria Day Parade on a beautiful float named Benevolence, which was drawn by a fine team of horses.

All Miss Jewell's dancing shows were in aid of charities or youth activities.

After Mona finished High School she took a business course at Sprott-Shaw Commercial School. In 1919 she became secretary to Donald B. Martyn, first Deputy Minister of Industry, a new provincial government portfolio.

Secretaries are not considered to be civil servants and are often replaced when different political parties take office. This did not happen to Mona Jewell, attesting to the high esteem in which she was held.

Mona Jewell's retirement years are full. She has visited twenty-three different countries, her favourites being Japan and Austria. She busies herself as a volunteer teacher of handicrafts for the Canadian Mental Health Association and makes dolls and other novelties for bazaars in aid of the White Cross Centre.

Interview With Miss Jean Lorimer and Her Sister Merle (Mrs. Cecil W. Davies)

On Friday April 4, 1975 I met with Miss Jean Lorimer and her sister Mrs. Davies in the old Lorimer home on South Turner Street. This lovely old home was built by their father, the late Mr. William A. Lorimer in 1907.

The Lorimer name in James Bay dates back farther than the early nineteen hundreds. It all began when Mr. William Lorimer and his wife Lily (Main) set out from Uddingston, Glasgow on the long journey to Victoria on Vancouver Island in the 1870s. Mr. William Lorimer was a draughtsman and was employed with the building of the Dallas Hotel. Later he worked at the Albion Iron Works.

Mr. and Mrs. W. Lorimer set up housekeeping in a large house at the corner of Powell and Toronto Streets. The Lorimer sisters can recall the many family gatherings at Christmas time in their paternal grandparents' home. The Lorimers had eight children, William A. was their father and along with his brothers Bob, Sam, Jim and Walter, his sisters Christina, Mrs. Widowson, Elizabeth, Mrs. Jackson and Miss Agnes-Ann continued to live in James Bay.

Their maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur, came from Prince Edward Island. Their mother, the former Miss Elsie Mae Arthur, "pupil taught" under Miss Agnes Deans Cameron at South Park School and then

went to teach for three years at Spring Ridge School. At this same time Christina Lorimer also wished to teach so she became a monitress at Kingston Street School before teaching at South Park.

When Miss Elsie M. Arthur had completed three years teaching at Spring Ridge School she went to San Francisco returning in a few years to marry Mr. William A. Lorimer, who was employed by the City Hall. Their first home was on Croft Street followed by a home on Rithet and then their own place on South Turner.

Mr. and Mrs. W.A. Lorimer had four children, Merle, Mrs. Cecil W. Davies, F. Jean, G. Marion, Mrs. Andrew Beaton and their only son Arthur. Miss Jean Lorimer and her sister Mrs. Davies live in Victoria. Mrs. Beaton resides in Kelowna and Arthur Lorimer who has recently retired as Theatre Manager in Los Angeles, California lives with his wife in that metropolis.

In 1912 the Lorimer family moved to the Gorge district and the children attended Craigflower School. It was during these years, 1912-1915, that their mother became very interested in parent teacher relationships and became involved in the formation of a P.T.A. In 1915 she had the honour of being the founder of The Parent Teacher Association for British Columbia at Craigflower School.

In 1924 Mr. and Mrs. Lorimer and family once more took up residence on South Turner Street. Their neighbours were a Mr. and Mrs. Brett and Mr. and Mrs. F.W. Davey, with sons Herbert, Ernest, Jack and Robert. The daughters Margaret, Mrs. Watchuk now residing in Calgary and Catherine, Mrs. Loudon in Victoria. Also living close by were the Sangsters. There were sons Alex and George and daughters Kate, Mrs. Silvester, Genevieve, Mrs. George Rogers, Alice, Mrs. MacMillan, Miss Margaret and Miss Victoria.

The Lorimers attended the Gorge Presbyterian Trinity Church on Tillicum at Walter Street followed by membership in James Bay Methodist Church. Miss Jean Lorimer is still active at James Bay United Church. She and her sister Merle remember when the seats in the sanctuary faced south instead of east as they do now.

Merle's husband, the late Mr. Cecil W. Davies, was one of a family of twelve whose home was at the corner of Luxton and Boyd Streets. At one time he was President of "The Young Peoples' Union" for the Victoria Presbytery which encompassed all of Vancouver Island and the adjacent isles. The aim of this union was an outreach to other denominations and eventually to become interdenominational. These young people met Sunday evening after their respective services at the "Y" for sing songs and refreshments.

Miss Jean Lorimer and her sister Mrs. C.W. Davies followed in their mother's footsteps and became excellent elementary school teachers. Merle began her career in the Cariboo and Jean at Jordan River. Jean also taught at Strawberry Vale, Tolmie and Tillicum. Then she was posted to South Park School, the second Miss Lorimer to fill a teaching position in that historic building, where she had been preceded by her Aunt Christina. Jean taught there for sixteen years prior to retirement.

Mr. W.A. Lorimer's uncle Jack Lorimer and his wife lived at the corner of Michigan and Government Streets, opposite to Mr. Leslie Clay's old home and where, today, stands a small apartment complex. This uncle's name is mentioned in Emily Carr's book, "The House of Small." In his home was a beautiful little French maple burl upright piano. It was a "Medallion of first class at all the Great Expositions."

The Lorimers liked living in James Bay for many reasons but one night Jean and her mother were particularly thankful. They planned taking the midnight boat to Vancouver. They proceeded in leisurely fashion to the C.P.R. wharf at the foot of Menzies Street on Belleville. Suddenly where were their tickets! They could not be found. Jean tore up Menzies Street to Simcoe, down to South Turner. There were the tickets on the dining room table. She hastened back to join her mother. Yes, in time to catch the midnight boat to Vancouver. It paid to live in James Bay in those days.

Mr. William A. Lorimer with his brothers Bob, Sam, Walter and Jack kept up a lively interest in sports all their lives. Miss Jean Lorimer has in her possession, for football, a silver cup with the inscription, "V.D.A.F.L.—Intermediate Capital A.A. 1902-1903." A nephew, H. Jackson was another sports enthusiast and two uncles, F.A. Jackson and F. Widowson, were active on the J.B.A.A. Rowing Team.

Baseball and Field Lacross were also enjoyed. There was the Amity Baseball Team and the Elk's Team. Walter Lorimer was manager of the latter. Where the old Crystal Gardens stands there used to be a ball park. The Lorimer sisters recall such names as Norman Forbes and the Copas brothers. Their uncle Fred Jackson and his son were keen participants. Fred Jackson's father was Dr. Jackson of the Marine Hospital at the Industrial Reserve.

Mr. William A. Lorimer was in charge of the Boys' Brigade and encouraged football. Jean remembers such names as Margison, Gelling, Hood, Naismith, Petch, Shepherd and Prior. Her father kept his interest in boys' work right up to the time of his death and was still employed by the City Hall in the Treasury Department. Her mother passed away in 1947 thus ending a very full life. We like to record the lives of these James Bay pioneers who played a definite role in the development of James Bay.

Astronomy Brought Down To Earth

LOUISE M. IVERSON

Robert Petrie (1901-66) was born in St. Andrews, Scotland, and came with his family, as a boy of five, to live on Rithet Street.

In his Matriculation year at Victoria High School he read two books on astronomy which fascinated him. After graduation he worked in Rithet's grocery department. He joined the Victoria Astronomical Society of Canada and decided to make that his life's work.

From Victoria College he went to U.B.C. for his B.A.

He received his M.A. and Doctorate of Michigan, where he joined the instruction

At the age of 34 he became a Fellow of the Society of Canada and joined the staff of the Dominion Astrophysical Observatory in 1935.

In 1961 he became the second astronomer to win the Henry Marshall Tory medal of the Royal Society of Canada. Three years later he was appointed Dominion astronomer, controlling three observatories in Western Canada, including the radio-telescope at White Lake, south of Penticton.

Dr. Petrie gave scientific leadership to the study of radial velocities and galactic motion, and his thoroughness and insight brought many astronomic projects to effective conclusion.

Canada's status in the world of astronomy was to be enhanced by the 150 inch Queen Elizabeth II telescope, primarily Dr. Petrie's achievement.

Together with his scholarship he possessed rare personal qualities, firmness and strength of character, and was a man of great tolerance.

He had the gift of being able to explain his difficult subject in language which the general public could appreciate. He had a sense of wonder of the universe, believing that familiarity leads to greater awe and livelier curiosity.

He bore his letters with distinction, B.A., M.A., Ph.D., F.R.S.C., F.R.A.S., and it was said Robert Petrie was one of Canada's most gifted, learned men, a great scientist, coupled with a deep sense of humour and friendliness.

On his death on April 8, 1966, the Senate of the University of Victoria paid tribute to him as a distinguished scientist, lifelong friend of the institution and a man of uncommon personal stature. The R.M. Petrie Memorial Fund was set up at that time to be administered by the University.

Here was truly one of James Bay's great!

Frederick W. Davey

F.W. Davey came to Victoria from his native England when a young man. He joined the local Post Office staff in 1888 and transferred to the Customs two years later. In 1904 he was appointed to the office of Customs Surveyor and in 1922, when J.C. Newbury retired as Collector of Customs and Internal Revenue, Mr. Davey took over his post.

In 1897 Fred Davey had been sent to the Yukon where he witnessed some of the excitement of the Klondike gold-rush days. He went over the White Pass route in June and came out over the Chilkoot Pass in November.

Ten years later he went to install a customs office in the new town of Prince Rupert.

The Davey family home was at 126 South Turner Street, where Mr. and Mrs. Davey shared their hospitality and where their sons, Herbert, Jack and Bob, together with daughters, Margaret and Catherine, grew up.

Mr. Davey was a well thought of citizen of James Bay
