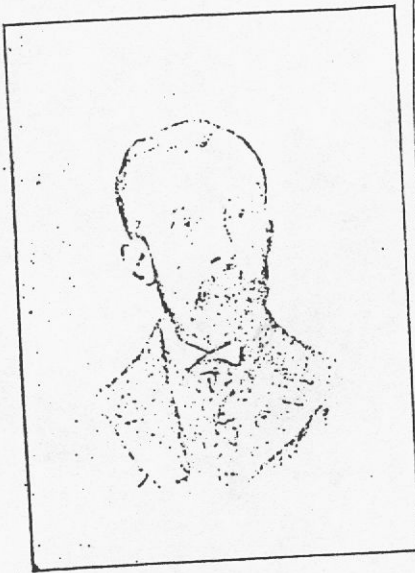

This structure has undergone a checkered past of renovations. Originally built as a two storey structure, two additional floors were proposed in 1891; in 1906 one floor was added to the designs of Francis Mawson Rattenbury. The corner has also been changed from rounded to angled. In 1912 the storefronts were altered by James & James, Architects. It was originally built by Burns and Edwards; James Burns was a local hardware merchant, who operated his business here for four years.

In 1884 the building was purchased by Thomas Dixon Galpin, the British investor; who added to the building the following year; Nicholles & Renouf rented the building as a warehouse from approximately 1887 until 1904. In 1888 it was purchased by the Canadian Pacific Land & Mortgage Company, who also added to the structure. The 1906 alterations were undertaken for the B.C. Land & Investment Agency. In 1977 unsympathetic renovations considerably altered the original character of the building.

ALDERMAN C. E. RENOUF.

It is a debatable point whether there be such a thing as "accident." Some authorities maintain that everything is ordered wisely and well, and the poet Pope maintained "that whatever is, is right," yet there are circumstances occurring to everyone, day by day, over which there seems to be no absolute control; certain conditions seem to influence people, yielding results so entirely different to the end or aim expected or contemplated, and these are brought about by incidents so trivial, that lacking a better term or name, we call it "accident;" be that as it may, as Sir Roger de Coverley used to remark, "There is much to be said on both sides." It seemed pretty much of an accident, or let us say a combination of fortuitous circumstances under somewhat peculiar conditions, that brought Mr. C. E. Renouf to these western shores. He was born at Jersey, one of the Channel Islands, in 1861, the same year in which Victoria was incorporated as a city. Until 1878 he attended school on that island, at which period he came to British Columbia by way of Cape Horn—chiefly on pleasure bent—arriving in March, 1879. Shortly after his arrival he accepted a position with the Hastings Mill Company, at Burrards Inlet (now Vancouver) where he remained four years. Vancouver city did not then exist and was known only as Granville, had two saw mills in operation, with a surrounding population of about 100 people. He returned to Victoria in 1883 and for two years occupied a position with R. P. Rithet & Co. In 1885 he formed a co-partnership with Mr. J. Nicholles, as Nicholles & Renouf, carrying on business as iron and hardware merchants in the commodious premises corner of Broad and Yates streets. Mr. Renouf is an enthusiastic promoter of the agricultural developments of the island and province, to which he has devoted much time and money. He came from a well known farming stock in Jersey, and his early fondness for pastoral pursuits still tenaciously clings to him. He is one of the most active members of the British Columbia Agricultural Society, and has served it well in the capacity of honorary secretary for a number of years. Mainly through his own personal exertions, the society has been instrumental in raising funds for the erection of a permanent exhibition building, which is now being erected in Victoria (a full description and illustration of which will

be found on another page) from plans and designs made by Architect Soule, which, when completed, will cost about \$25,000, and will then be turned over to the city council. This will be owned and held in trust for the agricultural and horticultural community, and be governed by five trustees, three to be chosen by the Agricultural Society and two by the council. The advantages of an institution of this kind for the encouragement of these industries must be apparent to all in the advancement and impetus it will give to these pursuits, and the honest and friendly rivalry it will engender among those engaged in them, and will be of vast importance in showing not only what the province is capable of, but also the remarkable and profitable possibilities they possess. Mr. Renouf was elected an alderman for Yates Street Ward early this year, being returned at the head of the poll. He takes an active interest in the proceedings of the city council, and as chairman of the finance committee, guards the expenditure of the city with judicious care. He is also a member of the Masonic order, and of the A. O. U. W. Mr. Renouf is married, and occupies a beautiful home on Dallas Road, charmingly laid out, harmonious and attractive, which is of itself a delightful proof of the enthusiasm of his horticultural tastes.

crochery and glass wares, lamps, ornaments, silver-ware and all kinds of house furnishing goods. Their display of linoleums, oil-cloths and carpets, the latter mostly of the celebrated Crossley make, would seem in themselves to be sufficient for a handsome business. The firm has been a remarkably successful one, and the cut of their warehouse, shown in these pages, can give but a faint idea of the immense business transacted within its walls.

M. R. SMITH,

Senior member of the firm of M. R. Smith & Co., commenced business in the bread-baking line in the year 1858, carrying on operations, with the aid of his two sons and wife, until the present time, and has now the largest business in his line in the city, if not in the province. Two years ago he established a steam factory, the only one of the kind in Victoria. He keeps twenty-six hands constantly employed, turning out bread, cakes, biscuits, jumbles, etc., etc. They supply the bulk of the Indian trade in pilot biscuits between here and Alaska. The factory is a large three-story and basement building on Niagara street, 25 x 84, with outbuildings and stables. The bread is all baked in the basement. A forty horse-power engine runs the machinery on the upper floors. Smith & Co.'s bread and cakes are well and favorably known to the house-keepers of the city.

NICHOLLES AND RENOUF.

This firm is composed of Mr. J. Nicholles, a native of London, England, who came here in 1862; followed civil engineering from 1869 to 1875, and later was connected with the firm of Garesche, Green & Co., bankers, and Mr. C. E. Renouf, who is a native of the Isle of Jersey, and came direct from there in 1879. He was connected with the Hasting's Saw Mill Co. and R. P. Rithet & Co. until the present firm was started, in 1885. Mr. Renouf was elected Alderman, Jan. 1st, 1891. The firm does a general hardware and implement business, both wholesale and retail, carrying a large stock of shelf and heavy hardware, agricultural implements, mining and mill machinery. The business for the first two years was about one-third in volume the amount that it stands at present. They are agents for A. Harris, Son & Co., (limited), Harvesting Machinery; Cockshutt Plough Co.; I. O. Wisner, Sons & Co., Seed Drills and Seeders; Waterhouse Engine Works Co., of Brantford, and many other concerns as famous as those mentioned. They are also agents for the Hartford Fire Insurance Co., and the Scottish Union and National Fire Insurance Companies. Messrs. Nicholles and Renouf have many other large business interests, and Mr. Renouf has devoted himself greatly to civic affairs; he has been among the foremost to interest himself in the annual exhibitions, the success of which is, in a great measure, due to his efforts.

VICTORIA VINEGAR AND SAUCE WORKS.

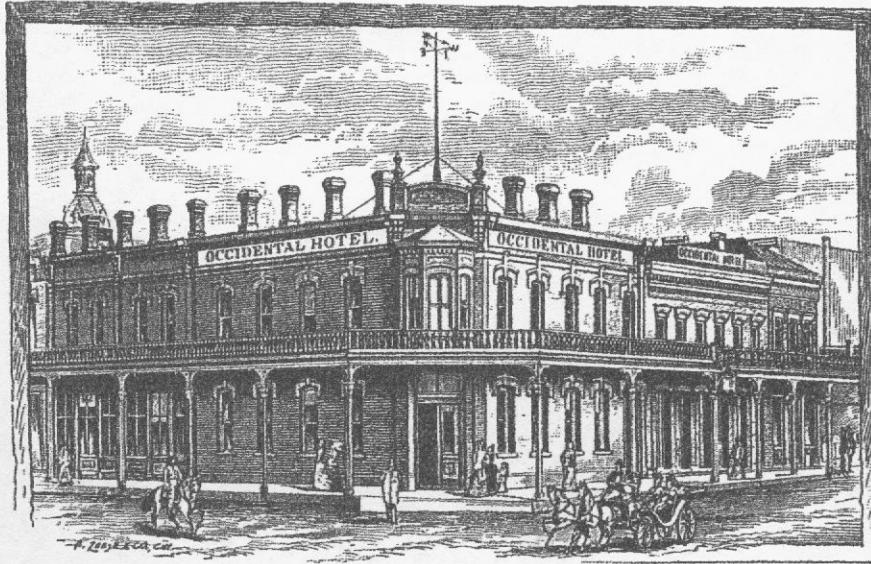
Mr. J. H. Falconer, of the firm of Badgerow & Falconer, well known vinegar manufacturers of Toronto, arrived in Victoria in the early part of last Spring, and at once commenced extensive improvements to the building of Joseph Heywood, next to the city electric light building, for the establishment, under the firm name of J. H. Falconer, of vinegar, sauce, pickles and preserving works. He at once set about manufacturing malt, cider, white wine, raspberry and strawberry vinegars, also malt vinegar in bottles, pure apple cider, sweet cider, clarified cider, refined cider, fancy mixed pickles, sauces, tomato catsup (by a new process), flavoring extracts, lemon and vanilla, also mushroom catsup, maple syrup and other table delicacies. There were many who doubted the success of this new enterprise, owing to the prejudice supposed to exist against goods of this description of local manufacture, but the result showed

the falsity of such ideas. From the outset the business has been a success, and the demand, which now extends from all parts of the province, is increasing daily. Mr. Falconer is an expert in his line of business, and has had a remarkable experience for a young man, having gone on a tour through Europe for the purpose of securing a transfer, in Germany and other places, of the best known patents and processes for making vinegar. He also worked for a period in one of the largest malt vinegar manufactories of London, England, for the purpose of acquiring a thorough knowledge of the most improved process adopted so far in that country. Mr. Falconer is a Scotchman by birth, and stands high in business circles for ability and integrity.

TURNER, BEETON AND CO.

No Victoria firm has a higher standing than this one, which is composed of Mr. J. H. Turner, M. P. P. and Minister of Agriculture and Finance, and Mr. H. C. Beeton, Agent General. Mr. Turner has charge of the business at Victoria, and Mr. Beeton, at London, England. The firm occupies its own premises at the foot of Yates street, in a brick building 75 x 125 feet, while below them, on the wharves at the water front, they have five bonded and other warehouses, which will be seen in this book, and which occupy a frontage of 300 feet, providing facilities for the loading and discharging of the numerous steamers and sailing vessels always at the wharves, and for the storage of immense quantities of goods. The firm's enterprises are numerous and far reaching; besides driving a large

salmon cannery business they are interested in general merchandising and are agents for the following houses in Europe and elsewhere: M. B. Foster & Sons, London, England; John Hall & Son, London, England; J. S. Fry & Son, Bristol, England; Geo. Wostenholme & Son, (limited), Sheffield, England; Williams, Humbert & Co., London, England; Doulton & Co., London, England; Jonas Brooks, Bros., Huddersfield, England; Wm. Jameson & Co., Dublin, Ireland; Bouteleau & Co., Barbezieux, France; G. Preller & Co., Bordeaux, France; Cock-



burn, Smithers & Co., London and Oporto; Hiram Walker & Sons, Walkerville, Canada. They represent, also, the following Fire and Marine Insurance Companies: Guardian, North British and Mercantile, of London, and Commercial Insurance Co., (Marine), San Francisco, Cal. In salmon canning they own their own cannery, the "Inverness," on the Skeena river, and are agents for the "Balmoral," also a Skeena river cannery. Mr. Turner, of the firm, is a native of England, and first came to British Columbia in 1862; he was one of the committee for forming the volunteers of Vancouver Island, and retired into the reserve militia in June, 1881, with the commission of Lieutenant-Colonel. He was elected to the City Council of Victoria in 1877 and served two years, subsequently occupying the mayoralty chair for three successive years. He was also Chairman of the B. C. Benevolent Society and the Royal Hospital for three years. Mr. Beeton, who is a man of very considerable literary ability and learning, is peculiarly well fitted for the office of Agent General, and has done much for the province in giving intelligent reports of the country's needs and advantages to the people of England.

MARVIN AND TILTON.

Mr. Edgar Marvin, of this house, recently deceased, was a native of Syracuse, N. Y., and was a forty-niner in California with U. S. Senator Felton, with whom he came to Victoria in 1862 and started the present house. Mr. Edward G. Tilton is a native of Delaware, and came to Puget Sound in 1852 with his father, being the first Surveyor General to Washington. He remained in the Puget Sound country until 1865, returned

to weigh well the circumstances and prospects of any enterprise before undertaking it; but having once given it his sanction he throws heart and soul into the thing, and invariably finds success with the issue. He is of a genial and social disposition, and is always among the foremost to do or to give when the honor or the interests of his chosen home are at stake, and his aid and counsel are always sought among the first.

McKillican, W. D., Alderman. Among the goodly number of citizens who have the interest and welfare of Victoria really at heart it may, without fear of contradiction, be said that none hold a more prominent place than Mr. W. D. McKillican, whose untiring energy and zeal in every enterprise pertaining to the advancement of the city has won for him the esteem and highest appreciation of all who know him. Mr. McKillican is a native of Canada, born at Vankleek Hill, Ont., in 1836, and came to Victoria in 1871, where he established himself in business as a contractor and builder. In 1878 he entered into partnership with Mr. J. W. Anderson, under the name of McKillican & Anderson, and the firm at present is to be congratulated on being the recipient of a large and increasing patronage, the general confidence and public esteem which a system of upright and straightforward dealing in all business transactions has gained for it. He has served six years in the City Council under different administrations, and at the last election was again returned to serve the city.

Munn, H A, Alderman. Among those who have hitherto assisted to build up the city of Victoria and to extend its reputation it may be truly said that none have been more active in this respect than Mr. H. A. Munn, and it was but a just acknowledgment of his public worth as a citizen who has the welfare of Victoria at heart, that at the late municipal election he was elected to the City Council as one of the representatives of James Bay ward. Mr. Munn is a young man of broad and liberal views; takes an active interest in politics, advocates a spirited policy in the matter of civic improvement, and believes in building, not for the present, but for the future, in which he has unlimited faith, of the greatness of Victoria.

Renouf, C E, Alderman. At the late municipal election Mr. Renouf, of the well-known firm of Nicholles & Renouf, was elected a city councillor by a large majority over his opponent. He is a man of sound business principles, and taking into consideration his extensive knowledge of the needs of the city, its resources and liabilities, will no doubt prove a very valuable member of the city government. He is a man closely identified with the interests of Victoria, and gives much of his time and money to stimulate any enterprise which tends to benefit the city. Until recently he was secretary of the British Columbia Agricultural Society.

Richards, Jr, F G, Alderman. Mr. Richards, we learn, is the son of an Englishman, but was born at Dodgeville, Wis., in 1855, his parents having emigrated to the United States in the early fifties. Robertson, John, Alderman. The gentleman whose name heads this sketch is too well known in this city and province to need any introduction from us, even had we space to devote to anything more than a brief notice of such an honorable career as is attached to the name of Mr. Robertson. He is a native of Scotland, having been born at Blair Athol, Perthshire, in 1832, and has an ancestral pedigree of which he may be justly proud, his father being one of the old Struam Robertson's. He came to Victoria twenty-seven years ago and engaged in horse-shoeing, and for a time was also employed at Tray's Yard. Hilbert, John, Mayor. One of Nanaimo's most popular and prominent citizens is the subject of this sketch. Mayor Hilbert was born in Lincolnshire, England, in 1845, where, after serving seven years as a carpenter's apprentice, he worked at his trade until he came to British Columbia, landing at Nanaimo in the year 1874. 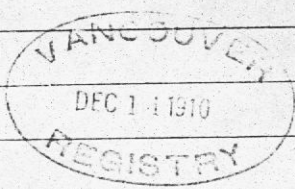

SWAYNE, CHARLES ROBERT CRAWFORD

Death of Editor Ends Long Journalistic Career

CHARLES Robert Crawford Swayne, editor in chief of The Daily Colonist for more than twenty-five years and one of British Columbia's outstanding journalists, died shortly before 9 o'clock Monday night. He was sixty-three years of age.

Mr. Swayne entered St. Joseph's Hospital more than a week ago, after suffering intermittent periods of indifferent health over a number of years, and failed to rally following an operation performed a few days ago.

Deeply cultured and a man of wide interests and personal courtesy, Mr. Swayne had a host of friends in many walks of life, both in Victoria and across the Dominion, who will deeply regret his passing.

He was born in 1880 in Kilkenny, Ireland, the son of Frank R. Swayne, manager of the Kilkenny branch of the Bank of Ireland. Educated at Foyle College, Londonderry, he joined the Bank of Ireland staff in Dublin on graduation.

At the age of eighteen years he made his entry into journalism on the staff of The Daily Mail, in London, and as a reporter rapidly made a name for himself and was given many special assignments. London did not agree with his health, however, and in 1906 he came directly to Victoria, where he immediately joined the staff of The Victoria Daily Times as sporting editor and reporter.

JOINS STAFF OF DAILY COLONIST

Thirty-four years ago, on the invitation of the late J. S. H. Matson, publisher of The Daily Colonist until his death in 1931, Mr. Swayne joined the staff of this paper as a reporter. He became city editor for a period, and then for several years was assistant editorial writer under the editor-

latter's death he succeeded to the position of editor-in-chief.

He was a member of the Empire Press Union, and had been several times on the directorate of The Canadian Press. He was also a director of The Colonist Printing & Publishing Co., Ltd.

Over a long period of years he exercised through his writings a wide influence on the conduct of public affairs. He was keenly interested in literature, and each day brought treasured pieces of his own selection before the public in a section devoted to fine arts. His philosophical writings had been for many years a feature of the Sunday editions, and were widely quoted.

An ardent athlete in earlier days, Mr. Swayne was at one time a ranking tennis player in this community, where he did much to promote that sport. He was president of the old Kingston Street Tennis Club, nursery of many of Victoria's finer players, and later was a member of the Armadale Tennis Club. He also played a good game of golf.

He is survived by his widow, at home, 993 Admirals Road; three daughters, Mrs. Ronald Wilkins, at the family residence, whose husband is a major overseas with the R.C.E.; Mrs. T. Stephenson, London, England, where her husband is a cap-

City Mourns Loss Of Colonist Editor

Victorians, with a host of friends throughout the Dominion were joined today in a spirit of personal loss over the death of that kindly, quiet man, Charles Robert Crawford Swayne, who sat in the editorial chair of The Daily Colonist for over 25 years.

Mr. Swayne, 63, died shortly before 9 Monday night, failing to respond to an operation performed at St. Joseph's Hospital some days ago. He had been under close medical care more than a week following intermittent spells of indifferent health for a period of years.

A man of warm friendliness, quiet humor and wide abilities in the journalistic field, he wielded an appreciable influence over the thinking of the community he had made his own. Of deep scholarship, he lent to special Sunday features a philosophical touch which won him countless readers here and in other parts.

He had been one of the first directors of the Canadian Press and a member of the Empire Press Union.

In addition to being editor-in-chief he held a post as director of The Colonist Printing & Publishing Co. Ltd.

WITH DAILY MAIL

Born in 1880 in Kilkenny, Ireland, the son of Frank R. Swayne, manager of the Kilkenny branch of the Bank of Ireland, Mr. Swayne was educated at Foyle College, Londonderry, Ireland. Following graduation he joined the Dublin branch of the Bank of Ireland, but left that field for journalism at the age of 18. As

a member of The Daily Mail staff, London, he achieved some distinction in the reportorial world, covering many special assignments.

Mr. Swayne came directly from the metropolis to Victoria in 1906 in search of a climate more suitable to his health.

Here he joined the staff of the Daily Times, handling the sports desk and doing general reporting before becoming telegraph editor.

In 1909 he joined the Colonist, at the invitation of the late J. S. H. Matson, publisher, and remained on that paper until his death. Following a term as city editor, he was appointed assistant editorial writer under the late Charles H. Lugin and followed him as editor-in-chief on the latter's death.

ACTIVE IN SPORTS

Mr. Swayne was active for some years in athletics, playing tennis in his earlier years and retaining a keen interest in the sport through his daughters when he passed the participating stage himself. At one time he was president of Kingston Street Tennis Club and later joined Armadale. He also played golf. A regular attendant at major rugby matches, he enjoyed a personal friendship with many of the city's leading players and was something of an authority on cricket, rowing and other sports.

Besides his wife at the family home, 923 Admirals Road, he is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Ronald Wilkins at the family residence, Mrs. T. Stephenson, London, England, and Miss Doreen Swayne with the C.W.A.C., Macdonald College, St. Anne de Bellevue, Que. A brother, F. H. Swayne, lives at 2493 Currie Road, and one sister, Mrs. Kathleen Hamilton, in Seattle. One son-in-law, Maj. Robert Wilkins, is overseas with the R.C.E., and another, Capt. T. Stephenson, is with the Imperial forces.

Funeral services will be held in Christ Church Cathedral Wednesday at 10.30, with Bishop H. E. Sexton officiating. Interment will be at Colwood Burial Park. S. J. Curry & Son are in charge of arrangements. The family requests no flowers be sent.

Charles Swayne

THOSE OF US WHO WERE PRIVILEGED to enjoy the friendship of Charles Swayne during the long period in which he occupied the chief editorial chair of the Colonist are experiencing a deep sense of personal loss today. Not only did we know him as a competent journalist with an equipment which had enabled him to write with authority and conviction upon a vast variety of subjects; we knew him for his lofty ideals and those fine human qualities which commanded the loyalty and admiration of those with whom he had daily association. We realize how genuinely they mourn his passing.

Mr. Swayne was essentially a student, unassuming, reserved. His command of phrase, the facility with which he drew on a reservoir of profound knowledge, bore witness to the wealth and depth of his studies and his fine philosophy. If he manifested no aggressive enthusiasm for the hurly-burly of the profession of his choice, if he shunned the glare of contemporary life and its often superfluous trappings, his inner feelings and the newspaper he served so faithfully and well were the beneficiaries. With some of his judgments in respect of public discussion this department occasionally disagreed; but always with the knowledge that his opinions were the product of sincere conviction. Therein lay the virtue of his concept of honest craftsmanship. But an issue with Mr. Swayne was an issue; it never plagued him after he had left his office. Here was the man we could call friend.

Neither his natural reticence nor his traditional reserve robbed Charles Swayne of his sense of Irish humor; the same facility of expression which clothed his philosophical writings with great beauty stood him in good stead in the realm of sportsmanship. At tennis or at golf, he was the humble winner and the gracious loser. He knew and loved the appeal of the out-of-doors; his garden at Esquimalt brought him much joy and compensation. So we say farewell to one of Nature's gentlemen and express the hope that his sorrowing family will find a measure of consolation in the fact that the husband and father who has now gone was a good man.
