The Old Cemeteries Society is having a ZOOM meeting this coming Sunday, November 27th at 2:00 pm.


With John Adams:

Many of the people who owned these businesses or worked in them are buried at Ross Bay Cemetery. December 7, 2002 for the talk by historian John Adams.

Please join with John Adams and the Hallmark Heritage Society as we hold our first major meeting since COVID.

At 7pm, on Wednesday, December 7th, we shall meet at the James Bay New Horizons Centre, 234 Menzies Street, as John Adams, author of *Chinese Victoria: A Long and Difficult Journey*, for an illustrated talk about the buildings of Chinatown, from the gold-rush era to the present day. Discover how wooden structures gradually gave way to brick ones, and some of the earliest brick structures were replaced by bigger ones. Find out about the changing architectural styles, civic bylaws that had an impact on Chinatown's built environment and its social patterns, and some of the architects who designed Chinatown's surviving heritage infrastructure. The talk will focus on past developments but will also trace the conservation movement that affected Chinatown as early as the 1960s and continues to today.
