From John Dam, Hallmark Heritage Society President. The Revitalization of the Sheam & Low, Lee Mong Kow, & Sing Lee Buildings

The oldest and most intact Chinatown in Canada is currently undergoing a transformation of its built heritage. While carefully maintaining the character of the district, the function of the buildings are being energetically revitalized. One project speaks to this effort above all others at this time – the conservation of the Sheam & Low, Lee Mong Kow, and Sing Lee 'block' at the northwest corner of Fan Tan Alley. All three were built during the boom and bust of the closing Edwardian Era and capably represent the economic and cultural sentiment of the time.

Today, they are being prepared to undergo a transformation envisioned by the Salient Group, and its President Robert Fung, that will see them as vital and busy as they once were 125 years ago. The three dual-use buildings, fused into one 'block' by a continuous facade, are expressive of the Chinese influx and influence into this part of town.

Like most buildings in Chinatown, the architecture presented the appearance of assimilating 'western' design along the street, while holding on to cultural traditions in the inner cores with thriving theatres, tenements, and gambling houses. Commercial activity

time, entertainment venues like the the Shake Shake Hand Club.

The renovation and repurposing of the buildings is being guided, in a large part, by the recent discovery of the original spatial demarcation and artifacts, during the current development process. This unique circumstance has become the focus of the preservation strategy to retain character while revitalizing function. Based on the discoveries made, it is the goal of Salient to stabilize the building and reintroduce use that will help it, and the neighbourhood, remain relevant, evolving on the strength of its historic authentic past. The restoration work will be complex and detailed, maintaining the existing tenancies and commercial activity throughout the process, while adding new commercial enterprises.

An experiential micro-hotel will re-create spaces evocative of the historic residential past to provide opportunities to share this history with guests and encourage visitors to engage with it while a restaurant is planned as a new economic use for the forgotten courtyard.

Completion of the building preservation work is expected by the end of this year while the courtyard renewal is anticipated to proceed immediately after.

SV Dorothy Wins

SV Dorothy, Oldest Canadian-built Sailboat, Wins 2024 Classic Boat Award The Maritime Museum of BC's classic 30' sailboat Dorothy, built in Victoria in 1897 is back in the winner's circle! Supporters of Dorothy's extensive refit and continued sailing along the BC coast have been anticipating the news of the 2024 Classic Boat Awards, administered by the yachting world's most prestigious magazine, UK- based Classic Boat Magazine. The results are in: Dorothy, the sole Canadian boat in her competitive category, won a Classic Boat Award! The announcement was made today at Royal Thames Yacht Club in London.



On Thursday, April 25, 2024, at 7:30 p.m., the Victoria Historical Society presents at the James Bay New Horizons Centre, 234 Menzies Street, Brian Thom speaking of Cordova Bay Archeology covering an area of the Saanich peninsula between PKOLS (Mt Douglas) and Cowichan Head – essentially the treaty of Cordova Bay. This treaty, made with WETAM ELTW (Whutsaymullet as it was written then) and numerous other families who attended, was nearly identical to the other Vancouver Island treaties, promising to set aside the village sites and enclosed fields as well guarantees around hunting and fishing rights. While families were living in at least two longhouses in the village known as TEL ILCE (as it is written in SENĆOŦEN) / colíic (as it is written in lokwoŋon) in Cordova Bay in the 1850s, the lands that housed and sustained the community were never reserved, and indeed came to be privately owned in the decades that followed. Today, the archaeological footprints of the original people of TEL IŁĆE / calific are found throughout Cordova Bay, but very few have been well documented. In the summer of 2023, the University of Victoria's Anthropology Department partnered with Tsawout First Nation to undertake archaeological mapping and excavations on all the Cordova Bay waterfront properties held by the District of Saanich, and in intertidal area. This talk will share something what this archaeological work revealed, alongside oral histories and other records of the Cordova Bay area.
