OUR SUCCESS STORY This has been another tremendously busy year for the executive and many of the members now involved on our support committees. Since February 1980 when our newsletter bore the screamingheadline "WE DID IT - JACKSON HOUSE SAVED", it has indeed been a time of much doing by many people giving of energy and efforts far beyond the mere bounds of paid-up membershipness.

Those of you who saw the Open House in 1980 and this year's Open House on July 12th can really appreciate what our Society - all volunteers - have accomplished. And since the Open House, the interior finishing touches have been completed and the tenants moved in to the four apartments on August 15th.

FACTS

- (1) The house has been designated by the city;
- (2) The house now has an appraised value of \$215,000.00;
- (3) Exterior painting will soon be undertaken. A small sample of the proposed colour scheme is to be seen on the front bay window. COMMENT

A copy of a letter sent to the 'Times_Colonist by one of our members but not published, makes some interesting points:

''Asan old Victorian who has spent the last ten summers as a Tourist in her former home town, I'd like to comment on your excellent article concerning old house restoration in your July 11-12th issue. Based on "This Old House" by Bob Vila, first published years ago, this account appeared on the same weekend that scant publicity was being given to the local efforts to preserve and restore the Jackson house, a small miracle.

There has been criticism that so much time and effort has been lavished on a house that is not 'important' enough. As a typical modest house of its period it is every bit as important a part of Victoria's ambience as the, alas, razed and built-over mansions pictured in the refreshments room on Open House day at the Jackson House under the "Too Late" heading. The thing to remember is that time often is of the essence in making decisions to preserve, restore or renovate, and if funds to support the dedicated volunteers are small, then the beginnings must also be modest.

But preserve and restore we must if Victoria is to attract trave ller's rather than trippers; travellers are genuinely interested in its history houses and gardens. It is the Travellers who spend the big bucks, the Trippers who give downtown a carnival atmosphere distasteful to residents. I have never seen a poster, if indeed there is one advertising "Come to San Francisco", yet that city never lacks for visitors. I believe this to be because San Franciscans really love their own city and its downtown and seek to retain its attractions. Perhaps the Tourist bureau here should divert more of its advertising budget to helping Victoria keep what is left of its character, for why else should visitors put up with threats of being stranded by ferry strikes, uncertain mail service and high prices only to encounter more of the homogeneous blight?

So, let's hear it for more articles on restoration projects right here on the Island! I'm sure the Heritage Building Foundation of the Hallmark Society would be most cooperative. Sincerely, Hazel Wright Minch. "

RESEARCH

Lots to report in the Research Department. Under the able stewardship of Sue Lambeth and Jennifer Barr, we've separated Research into 2 sections: Inventory and Archives. Guided by Sue Lambeth, the Inventory Committee consists of about 20 active members who are busy updating and expanding our inventory of heritage buildings in Greater Victoria. Particular emphasis is being given to buildings in the City's "B" category. Currently we have only photos and addresses of these but a full inventory is now underway. The Committee is also working on those buildings that have been missed completely in previous inventories.

Jennifer Barr is in charge of Archives work and is busy preparing the Hallmark's application for Provincial funding to better sort, catalogue, cross-reference and preserve our very unique and valuable collection of photographic prints, slides and negatives of Greater Victoria's historic and architectural heritage. While funding is not assured, we're hoping to receive assistance of \$2500-3000 from the Cultural Services Branch of the Ministry of Provincial Secretary to be used primarily for purchase of the necessary materials to store and safeguard our collections. A matching contribution from the Society is required - either in time or in money - so the call will corne out soon - assuming we're successful in our application - for volunteers to assist in this project. In the meantime, anyone who's interested in helping with the ongoing Inventory or Archives work and who's been overlooked to date, please contact either Sue (598-0763) or Jennifer (598-9484). Thanks to the active members to date and to Sue and Jennifer for their ongoing hard work is certainly in order!
