OLD AND NEW

"WAY BACK WHEN", A new feature of the newsletter starting in this issue, and continuing through 1983, will highlight past activities of Hallmark with excerpts from previous minutes of executive meetings. The first excerpt follows.

"WAY BACK WHEN" Highlights from Minutes "At the first meeting of the Executive held April 12, 1973 at 1413 Fernwood Street, Mrs. Smyly asked for suggestions for a name for the the Society, proposing 'The Historical and Architectural Landmark Society' as a possibility. After some discussion, Miss Watkins moved the name be accepted, Mrs. Barnes seconded.

At the second meeting of the Executive April 25, 1973, Mrs. Smyly reported that the Registrar of Societies had required that the words 'Greater Victoria' be added to the name chosen for the Society as the name 'Historical and Architectural Landmark Society' was a descriptive name and was not limited geographically. However, as an invented name was short and more acceptable, the Registrar was willing to accept the shortened version of the name, and the Society was duly registered as 'The Hallmark Society'."

HURRAH FOR SUPER STUDENTS The Hallmark Society has received a Federal grant with which to hire students for the months of May through August, 1982. The project is, of course, in the field of heritage conservation—research, public access and promotion. They have a mandate to organize the files; improve public access to information and assist municipalities in compiling or revising inventories of heritage buildings that are suitable for designation and legal protection; organize and lead walking tours of Old Town and historical residential areas.

NEW LISTINGS

Focus for the summer is review of the City's inventory of residential heritage to ensure accuracy and completeness. Research is organized around the neighborhoods which are outlined in This Old House. James Bay has been completed, the next area to be tackled is Fairfield, followed by

Vic West. Take advantage of this opportunity to phone in the addresses of any residential properties meriting heritage review. Your next chance may be years away.

MUNICIPALITY OF ESQUIMALT

Another project completed by these very efficient students this summer was a report to the Municipality of Esquimalt on 675 Lampson Street. Esquimalt asked for our assessment of the historic importance of this house, as the municipality is considering designation of its first building.

Kathy Bridge is supervising the activities of the students during the summer and their orientation to research at the Provincial Archives. Student Coordinator is Anne Marie Cibulak and working with her are students Mary Beth Gibson and Monserrat Gonzales. Their work is concentrated on the inventory of "A" and "B" listed houses, as they are the ones that come up most often in Heritage Advisory Committee (HAC) meetings at City Hall. The Executive is very pleased with the results being produced by this group of students.

HERITAGE CONFERENCE 1982 HELD AT NEISON This conference was organized by The B.C. Heritage (Dogwood) Society and was hosted by The B.C. Heritage Trust and the Heritage Canada Foundation at Nelson for member groups June 4-6, 1982. Three members of The Hallmark Society attended: Peter Walton, panelist on the Heritage Advisory Committee workshop; Alexandra Innes, delegate for The Hallmark Society; Diane Lupien, private member. There were 70 member groups represented by delegates, and in all there were approximately 150 people at the conference which was held in the restored Hume Hotel, now called The Heritage Inn.

Nelson has a "main street" program going which has been developed and administered by Heritage Canada in concert with the Heritage Area Revitalization Program (HARP) of the provincial Heritage Conservation Branch. A team of architects and planners has been guiding the renovations to the main street heritage buildings in Nelson under this program. Many of the renovations subsidized under this program are complete or underway on several building facades along the city's main street, Baker Street. Further work isplanned for other heritage buildings in the Area. Nelson has the largest concentration of heritage buildings outside of Victoria and the Lower Mainland.

It is very likely that the next annual B.C. Heritage Society Conference will be held on Vancouver Island. The Hallmark Society has extended an invitation to host the gathering but current odds favour Duncan and the Cowichan Valley.

HOCKEY AND GARDENING

A General Meeting was held May 4, 1982 at Windsor Park Pavilion. Due to fine gardening weather and a Vancouver Canucks hockey game, attendance was low. WRITE IN CAMPAIGN

The owner of 555 Johnson St. has applied for a permit to demolish this 1888 heritage building. It is in the centre of the south side of the 500 block Johnson Street in the heart of Old Town. Because it is in the middle of an almost block-long facade of heritage hotels and office buildings, it is of the utmost importance that this building is protected now and that this protection continue.

City Council has, at this writing, given third reading to the heritage designation of this building. However, please let Victoria City Council know that the community of Greater Victoria continues to support the goal of heritage preservation in the City of Victoria. Let them know that you shop in downtown Victoria because of the heritage buildings, not in spite of them. Why should we let them know of our support at this time? Because Victoria City Council is also intending to rescind the bylaw designating Genge (Grant) House at 998 Humboldt Street rather than face the possibility of losing a \$135,000 law suit. If this course of action is followed, it could affect the eventual fate of 555 Johnson Street. If the city also rescinds the heritage designation of a building such as this to avoid a lawsuit, it could end the possibility of heritage buildings in Old Town being protected by designation.
