In January your elected president, Diane Lupien, resigned for personal reasons and as vice-president it was my pleasure and duty to take over her duties.

I am pleased to report another very successful year for Hallmark. Our membership has grown close to 300. Several successful events were held, such as the Harbour Tour of Heritage Buildings, the tour of Dola Cavendish House and Hatley Park, the Awards Night at the Art Gallery, the Dockyard Tour of heritage buildings, and a Historical Tour of Nanaimo via the E & N Railway. A very special thanks to those hard working people who were involved with the organization of these very interesting events.

Our annual fund raising Bazaar was held in October at 'Hillside', realizing over 400 badly needed dollars. Special thanks to Isla Tuck and her committee.

Hallmark was involved in an effort to save several houses at risk. Our successes were the Pooley House (1182 Old Esquimalt Rd.), Jolimont (1936 Hampshire), Maplewood (1133 Catherine St.), and the Gossett House (334 Michigan). All these buildings are very important and significant.

We were not so fortunate with 655 Niagara. After a prolonged battle, Mr. Hanrahan demolished this very restorable Italianate house.

ESQUIMALT Esquimalt will now have an official registry of heritage buildings in the REGISTRY municipality to be maintained and updated by the Hallmark Society. Council will now be aware of historically important buildings within their municipality.

WESTERN The heritage advisory committee appointed by the Capital Regional District COMMUNITY is chairmaned by Don Fawthorpe with 8 other volunteers and CRD representative Maureen Whitfield. The Committee's prime objective is to persuade Western Community residents to form a society to help create a museum that would preserve historic artifacts of significance to Langford, Colwood and View Royal. They have elected to restore the Caleb Pike Farmhouse (1883) on Millstream Road. Pike was the original settler in the Highlands.

MOSS COTTAGE Moss Cottage, the oldest building in Sooke, is now open to the public. The RE-OPENS 4 room cottage was built in 1870 with lumber cut in B.C.'s first successful steampowered sawmill, the Muir Mill on Sooke Harbour. The cottage was taken apart board by board, and re-assembled on the Sooke Museum grounds on Phillips Road. The Cottage is refurnished with authentic period furniture.

NANATMO CONFERENCE Don Luxton attended the conference and files this report:


"The conference of the Heritage Society of B.C. titled 'The Future of Our Past' was held in Nanaimo on May 24-27,1984. Delegates from many of the 140 historical and heritage societies from across B.C. attended, with workshops and discussion sessions being held. The conference was very well attended and was successful in bringing together many people with similar concerns and problems in dealing with heritage at the local level.

Several major issues were raised during the discussions. There is a continuing reliance on volunteers co-ordinating almost all heritage related work around the province. Government funding continues to be minimal, with total monies from the B.C. Heritage Trust standing at less than one dollar per person per year, with a Heritage Canada contribution of approximately twenty cents per year. Due to this minimal funding, there is an absence of design professionals involved in the heritage movement. There are also a number of continuing problems with heritage legislation, especially as regards compensation bylaws.

Several new B.C. Heritage Trust policies were also discussed, such as no funding being allowed for the moving of historic buildings, and conservation strategies now being required with heritage inventories.

These yearly conferences are a very valuable forum for the many active societies around B.C., and deserve our full support. Next year's conference will be held in Prince George."

1680 Prospect Place- a very large mansion with grounds, approx. \$200.000. Contact Glenlyon School.

- 132 South Turner- attractive Victorian Cottage with 2 bedrooms. In the heart of heritage James Bay, \$77,000. Call R. Lines 388-9326
- 228 Douglas St.- 6 suites, opposite Beacon Hill Park. Maclure (1907) \$190,000

252 Memorial Crescent- beautifully restored, 1892 \$90,000

<u>1462 Rockland</u>- 'Duvals" 1862 Victorian Gothic 7 suites, \$350,000 Other houses in the heritage news:

- 522 Quadra St. has been bought by an enthusiastic couple. Restoration has already begun.
- 617 Battery (Pinehurst) restoration is proceeding. There was an open house before work started. A great house with a remarkable amount of original finishes, fireplaces and hardware.
- 1182 Old Esquimalt Rd. (Pooley House) the new owner is doing superficial repairs until complete restoration can be done.
- 1133 Catherine St. (Maplewood) to be made available for sale next week by the city, price to be very reasonable--needs lots of work!
- 1108 Government (Old Royal Bank Building) it has just been bought by Jim Munro, who plans to restore it and amalgamate his bookstores there, hopefully to be open in a couple of months.
- 20,24,28 Douglas (Mile '0') the public hearing is coming up.
- 655-659 Niagara these two houses will be demolished very soon to make way for a \$750,000 nursing home. John Hall's house (1891) at 655 and the Herbert Cuthbert House (1910) at 659, despite neighborhood protest, will be levelled. Owner John Hanrahan offered to sell 655 to anyone who could come up with \$70,000, the price he paid. Unfortunately there were no takers.
- 1571 Amelia St. There was a major loss to heritage in Victoria on Monday, Sept. 3 when fire gutted 1571 Amelia, one of the houses in the fine heritage grouping on Amelia St. It was one of the three houses long been considered to be at risk as two were unoccupied and the third is occupied by Jessie Knight and her multitude of animals. The owner is not prepared to sell the houses in spite of many offers from heritage enthusiasts who would like to preserve them. One of the other houses in the group has been restored by architect Claude Maurice for use as his office. Newspaper accounts noted the fire damage at \$10,000, unfortunately the loss appears to be much worse.

## TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE HERITAGE BUILDING FOUNDATION OF THE HALLMARK SOCIETY

During 1983 and 1984 the fiscal year was changed to June 30th.

For the 12 months ending June 30,1984, gross rents were \$22,303.00 with expenses of \$18,786.09 and a rental income of \$3,516.91. This was mainly due to a new first mortgage from the B.C. Heritage Trust at 8% (In prior years it was 12%)

We still owe \$146,800.80 on the three mortgages on 427 Parry St. of of June 30,1984

During 1983/84 Capital additions of \$2,424.03 were made, these included a fence, a washer and dryer, kitchen vents and range hoods to suites 3 & 4, and an electric lawn mower.

At present the suites are rented as follows:
