





VICTORIA HERITAGE The Victoria Heritage Fojndation takes pleasure in once again HERITAGE inviting owners of Heritage Designated residences to apply for funding from our Building Restoration Programme. This Programme is designed to help offset the high costs of maintining a vintage home, and is available for restoration work, structural work, and other exterior work such as painting, etc. No funding is available for interiors, however.

> The Foundation will be accepting applications on a first-comefirst -served basis until July 31, 1985. Since funding is not actually confirmed until May 15, no projects can actually be approved until after that date.

A new feature of the Building Restoration Programme is that the Foundation MAY fund small projects costing under \$500.00 entirely. Usually, the cost of larger projects is split equally between the owner and the Foundation. In certain circumstances, it is also possible for the owner to receive full payment for materials, if he/she undertakes to do the work himself. Payment for all projects is only UPON SATISFACTORY COMPLETION, however, and upon receipt of PAID INVOICES.





NEW STREET TN VIC WEST

Council has accepted Ald. John Cooper's recommendation and will name a new street in Victoria West's Godfeldt subdivision Arthur Currie Lane.

Sir Arthur (1875-1933) was lieutenant-colonel of the B.C. Brigade, Canadian Garrison Artillery and commander of the 50th Regiment Gordon Highlanders.

He became commander of the First Canadian Division in the First World War and was then knighted and became commander of the First Canadian Division.

In 1919 he became the first general in the Canadian Army.

He taught in Sidney and Victoria and was involved in the insurance and real estate business in the city.

The street is a cul-de-sac running from Alston Street into the subdivision.

## 27-unit seniors' home approved near Mile O

A senior citizens' housing development was approved by city council Thursday night over protests from James Bay residents.

Henri Cote won the backing of council to build 27 suites at 20, 24 and 28 Douglas St. opposite Mile 0.

Cote will restore two heritage houses at 24 and 28 Douglas St. which now contain 15 suites and add a new St., and connect the three houses.

Charles Ball of the James Bay Residents League said the development did not fit in the neighborhood.

Other residents said the project would be the thin edge of the wedge to open the neigborhood to large developments.

Muriel Mixon, 23 Paddon Ave., said she objected to the zoning because it is contrary to the James Bay neighborhood plan and "will allow encroachment of developers into the community."

Cote's son, Bernie, presented a 429name petition in support of the development.

Acting mayor Ald. Gretchen building after demolishing 20 Douglas Brewin and Ald. Geoff Young opposed the rezoning.

Young said spot rezoning in this case was not desirable for the neighborhood.

Ald. Frank Carson, John Cooper and Eric Simmons, the only other council members present Thursday supported the redevelopment.
