The Heritage Building Foundation of the Hallmark Society

During the twelve month period ending June 30, 1985, the rental of the "Jackson House" produced gross rental income of \$21,352.50 and a net rental income of \$4,314.91.

We still owe \$142,900.60 on three mortgages and the B.C. Heritage Trust has very generously extended our first mortgage of over \$100,000.00 for another year at 8% per annum.

The loan of \$500.00 was repaid to the Hallmark Society, and we received tax deductible donations of \$700.00 in this fiscal year.

At present, all suites are rented and a member has been hired to manage the building.

A Balance Sheet and Statement of Rental Income and Expenses have been prepared and are available to any member on request.
