

As most of you are aware, Mayor and Council gave the goahead to the Cadillac-Fairview Eaton's proposal. Some changes were made to the original proposal but over 60% of the heritage buildings will be demolished, and Broad Street will be closed to the public. Not a satisfactory solution in our opinion, but because of our concern and many public and private presentations by Hallmark members, some changes were made. We spent over nine months fighting City Hall and Cadillac Fairview and countless meetings and presentations were made. Many thanks to all those volunteers who never gave up.

NOW ROUND 2!!! An eight storey office tower on Broughton Street has been proposed which would require a change in the zoning limitations. We have written a letter to Mayor and Council requesting that they take a firm stand on this issue and thus preserve the remaining downtown scale and character. This is what we were afraid of - eager applicants wanting changes in density and height. Council needs to quickly establish a downtown plan that spells out in exact terms what developers can and cannot do to our historic downtown.

For the past few weeks the media, mainly the "Times-Colonist", has written stories outlining Eric Charman's proposed Mozart House. According to our information, the Heritage Advisory Committee and the city planning department are concerned that a dangerous precedent could be set if the city density limit is increased.

The Hallmark Society is not against redevelopment, development, restoration, or renovation. We are not against Eric Charman's Mozart House. In fact, many of us find the design pleasing. HOWEVER, that is not the The point is that for this proposal to be approved, the city's density limit must be increased. that limit is increased, then existing heritage buildings in the downtown core would be threatened. It would become feasible for owners of heritage buildings in the downtown core to demolish them and build new ones. Currently older and heritage buildings are protected by the city's established zoning and a 50 foot height restriction.

Dear Mayor and Council:

The Hallmark Society would like to strongly protest any change in the current zoning limitations as currently requested by Mr. Eric Charman for an eight - storey office tower on Broughton Street. Such a change would have disastrous effects on the downtown core.

We urge Mayor and Council to take a firm stand on this issue and thus preserve the remaining downtown scale and character. The precedent has been set somewhat by the Cadillac-Fairview Eaton's Proposal, and now eager applicants for changes in density and height are beginning to surface.

We hasten you to quickly establish a downtown plan that spells out in exact terms what developers can and cannot do to our historic downtown.

The Hallmark Society is very concerned over the future implications of the Cadillac-Fairview Eaton's Proposal decision. We believe that discussions regarding the future development of our downtown should be ongoing and involve the community. We are prepared to cooperate in whatever way we can.

Heritage Update

"WHAT OUR MEMBERS ARE DOING"

Phase 2 - Saanich Heritage Building Inventory

Jennifer Barr is undertaking the Inventory which is coordinated by The Saanich Heritage Advisory and Archival Committee and funded by B.C. Heritage Trust. Currently Jennifer is driving the 507 kms of Saanich Municipality roads, taking photographs of all old, unique or architecturally interesting buildings. Subsequently, Jennifer will set up files for each of the building locations which will be arranged by alphabetical and numerical street address. The files will be located in the Saanich Municipal Archives. Approximately 800 buildings have been photographed to date and the Gordon Head, 10 Mile Point and Landsdowne area have yet to be photographed. The S.H.A.A.C. and Jennifer will determine which are the most outstanding examples of Saanich architecture and in-depth research will be undertaken by Jennifer on these buildings. The final product will be an updated version of the "Saanich Registry of Heritage Buildings" which hopefully will be completed before the end of 1987.

ASSESSMENT OF DOWNTOWN BUILDINGS ON THE HERITAGE REGISTRY

Several months ago our President, Paul Convey expressed concern that a "go-ahead" for the Cadillac-Fairview Eaton's proposal would have a ripple effect on other downtown buildings on the Heritage Registry. Consequently he requested an assessment of our files on those buildings in terms of the adequacy and the accuracy of our information so that when it became necessary to speak up we could do so from a basis of sound information.

The assessment is nearing completion and has revealed for us a number of areas to be filled in, but the most interesting revelation is that the 1986 registry as published by City Hall, although containing several worthy additions, makes no mention of seventeen buildings that were on the 1983 revision. We have some research to do and some information to compile for spokespersons in order that the aforementioned ripple may not become a torrent.


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*** Robert Patterson is the instructor at the course,

BROAD STREET PARKETTE ISSUE

A group of concerned individuals has taken it upon themselves to protest the almost complete enclosure of Broad Street and the partial destruction of the Broad Street facades of the Montague-Bridgman, Driard and Times buildings. That will mean that of the ten heritagelisted buildings on the site, six will be completely demolished and the facades of three of those four remaining will be partially demolished. The group wants support to retain the 50' square as recommended by Gwyn Symmons and if necessary the boycott of Eaton's by returning Eaton's credit cards and/or pledging not to shop at any Eaton's store. This information is being printed in our Newsletter to make everyone aware of what action is currently being taken by individuals other than The Hallmark Society or other heritage oriented groups. HERITAGE REVIEW PLANNED

Bill Reid, Minister of Tourism, Recreation and Culture announced February 20, plans for a Province-wide review of heritage resources and issues. Speaking to a meeting of the Presidents of Provincial Heritage Societies as part of Heritage Week celebrations, Reid unveiled "Project Pride -Celebrating our Heritage"

"Project Pride" is designed to stimulate individual community and provincial interest in heritage issues; to identify and encourage strategies for the preservation of important heritage resources; and to permit British Columbians to enter into discussion with their government about heritage

programs, policies and legislation.

A B.C. Heritage Task Force of five will tour the province in May and submit a formal report to the Ministry providing recommendations for future legislation, policies, and programs. It is anticipated that revised heritage legislation will be developed in the fall of 1987 and will be included in next spring's legislative program.
