

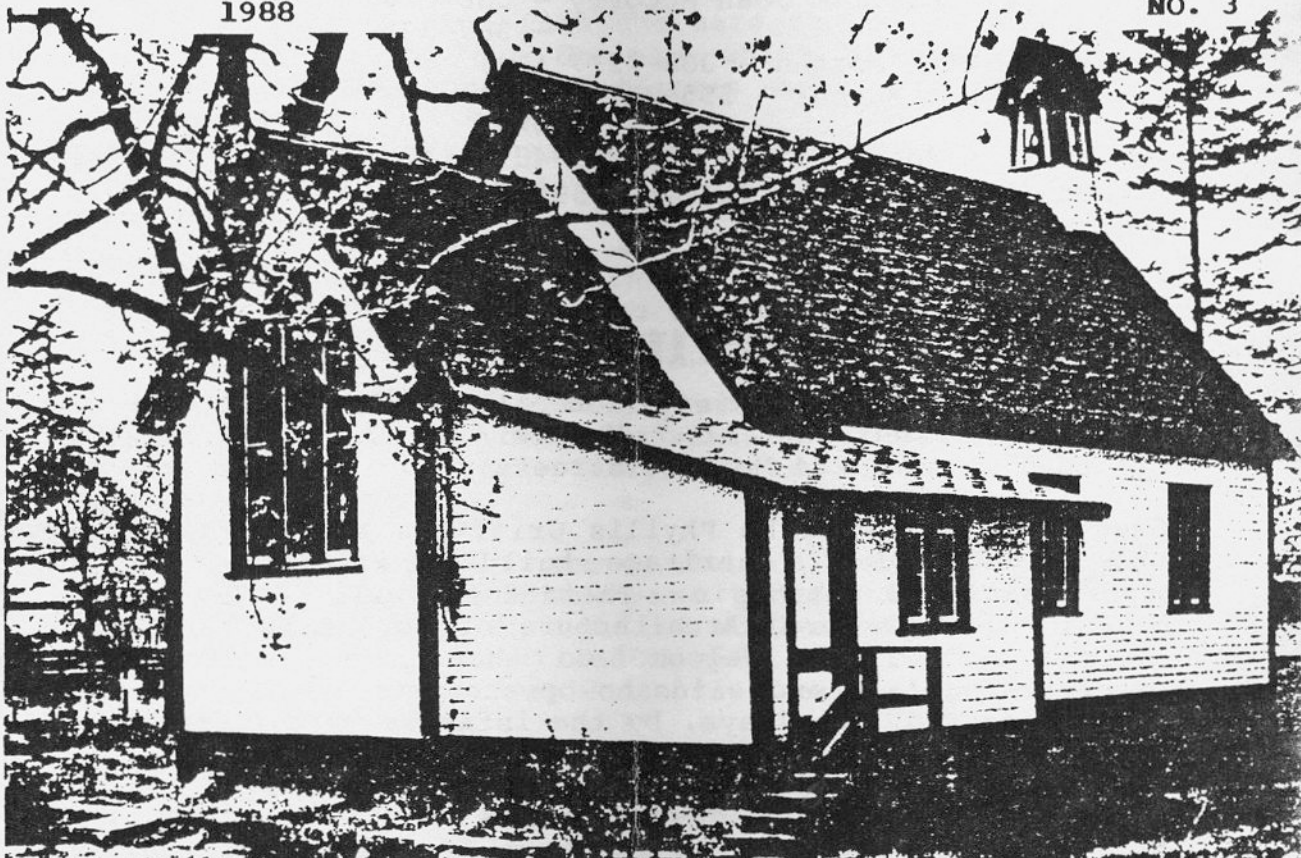

President's Message

After years of giving evidence to the contrary, our Society still has the reputation, among some members even of the heritage community, of being "too reactive." Trying to understand the implied complaint, I think that it means that the Hallmark Society always appears to be against, never for. The Society, say the complainers, never does anything positive.

Well, reputations, whether deserved or not, are very hard to live down. But I find this one hard to square with my own reasons for joining the Society--which had nothing to do with enjoying the company of raucous nay-sayers.

Because the Society does engage in controversies (usually worthwhile controversies), it is possible to forget its other positive services to the larger community.

The Hallmark Society has gathered and shared an extensive and valuable archive about the history and architecture of Greater Victoria.

It has reached out to educate and delight young and old through walking tours, slide talks, lectures, demonstrations, heritage fairs, photo contests--and this Newsletter.

It has given plenty of sound advice, over the years, to owners of heritage buildings--and I'm talking about advice that was asked for! Through its word-of-mouth network, it has directed work to skilled carpenters, roofers, chimney sweeps, stonemasons, woodturners, painters and other craftspeople.

It has supported other organizations and institutions with the greatest of contributions--good people. I mean the Heritage Advisory Committees of various municipalities, the Victoria Heritage Foundation, the Regional Heritage Committee. Would a programme such as the recent heritage home tour sponsored by the V.H.F. and the volunteers of the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria have been possible without the "footsoldiers" of the Hallmark Society?

The Society has undertaken valuable research and other work when no one else could, or would, bother: inventories, documentation of sites slated for demolition, sorting and cataloguing of historic photographs, cooperation with journalists seeking materials for a story about Victoria's heritage, liaison with heritage groups around the province and the nation.

Most important, the one consistent annual heritage party is thrown by--the Hallmark Society. Municipalities occasionally participate or contribute, but it is very much a Hallmark Society affair. And, as a professional working in a heritage agency remarked to me back in February, after our latest celebration, there is no more positive event for the heritage preservation cause in the Victoria area than the annual Hallmark Society Awards.

So, the Society has done--and continues to do--many positive things. What about the alleged negativity?

Of course, it is there, too. Unfortunately, we live and work in an environment which throws up forces which are worth fighting against: ignorance, stupidity, arrogance, indifference, hypocrisy. I prefer to think of it not as opposition but as advocacy: we speak for the living symbols of our common history. If we stop our advocacy--as some would have us do in order to make their own interests easier to achieve--what would the community lose? A true friend of its cultural history.

METCHOSIN READY TO PROTECT ITS HERITAGE

The Metchosin district recently adopted a heritage designation bylaw, so that it is in the position to afford legal protection to the many valuable heritage properties within its boundaries. This will be good news to heritage lovers in Greater Victoria for whom Metchosin has long been interesting territory to explore, for its aesthetic and historical riches. The Metchosin connection turns up in all sorts of ways. For example, architect Alexander Maxwell Muir, designer of the Times Buildings, the Board of Trade Building in Bastion Square, the former City Market and the Nairne cotage on Battery Street, built his own modest home in Metchosin and was linked by marriage with the Weir family, prominent in early Metchosin settlement. The recent inventory of heritage buildings in the Metchosin district--subject of a slide talk at the next Hallmark Society general meeting--is a good basis for a policy on preservation, and it is encouraging to discover that the municipality is carefully considering its next move, having already written to owners of properties in the inventory to congratulate them for taking part in this community resource. Metchosin is reviewing the experience of other municipalities and groups with heritage preservation, and to that end has approached The Hallmark Society for friendly advice--of course, gladly given! It seems that the congregation of historic St. Mary's Anglican Church, planning a new church down the road from the old one, are already consulting with the municipality about protecting the older structure, perhaps by designating it. It would make a suitable beginning for a programme of preservation.

Heritage Update

- *** A group of Cadboro Bay and Arbutus area residents have formed a non-profit society "The Goward House Society." They are trying to develop the house and the property as a senior citizen activity centre. This well-organized group has been looking at funding sources and hopes to turn the property into a Block House (Vancouver) style facility. Saanich Municipal Council will be considering this proposal shortly.
- *** The Royal Oak Lions Club have been developing plans to restore the old Royal Oak Schoolhouse (a designated Saanich heritage building) and use the interior as a local community meeting facility.
- *** 1911 Woodley Road, a designated heritage house in Saanich, designed by Maclure in approximately 1913, will shortly be undergoing a face lift. The present stucco surface will be removed and the original shingle siding restored.
- *** Patty Wells, an active Hallmark member, has been giving tours to school groups on the life of Emily Carr. All donations are being given to the Hallmark Society. Thank you Patty!!!! If you are interested in having a tour, please contact the Hallmark office at 382-4755.

HERITAGE CONSERVATION BRANCH REORGANIZATION

As of March 1, 1988, the Heritage Conservation Branch was divided into three separate branches (under the Ministry of Tourism, Recreation and Culture). One section is still called the Heritage Conservation Branch, which still supplies support staff to the British Columbia Heritage Trust, and still coordinates community heritage programs and heritage planning functions for the province. Dr. Colin Campbell is still the Director of the Heritage Conservation Branch. A new division, the Heritage Properties Branch under Director Wayne Carter, is now managing the provincially operated heritage sites like Barkerville, Fort Steele and in Victoria, Craigflower Manor, Helmcken House, Point Ellice House and the Richard Carr House. The former archaeological division of the old Heritage Conservation Branch has combined with Wilderness Tourism and is now the Resource Management Branch, under Director Brian Apland.

The Victoria historic houses under the provincial government's new Heritage Properties Branch will be opening for the summer season--Craigflower Manor from June 1st and Point Ellice House and Helmcken House from June 30th. There have been changes made in the displays over the past winter and entrance fees will now be by donation. There has been an extensive cataloguing program of the collections of Helmcken House, as well as restoration of the interiors.

Point Ellice House has been undergoing conservation work on buildings, grounds and the collections, with work on the buildings and grounds ongoing over the summer. All 3 properties will be open 5 days a week 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., closed Tuesdays and Wednesdays.



DOWNTOWN VICTORIA HERITAGE INVENTORY

The Foundation Group Designs, Don Luxton and Valda Vidners, principals, has been awarded the contract to undertake the Downtown Victoria Heritage Inventory and Management Plan, time frame commencing in May and continuing until the end of October. The process will include gathering and verifying previous research information, systematically looking at the building stock to ensure consistency on the inventory and to seek public input from concerned citizens and groups. The Management Plan will address questions of city policy, legislation and incentives for Victoria's downtown heritage buildings. Dates of public meetings will be announced shortly.

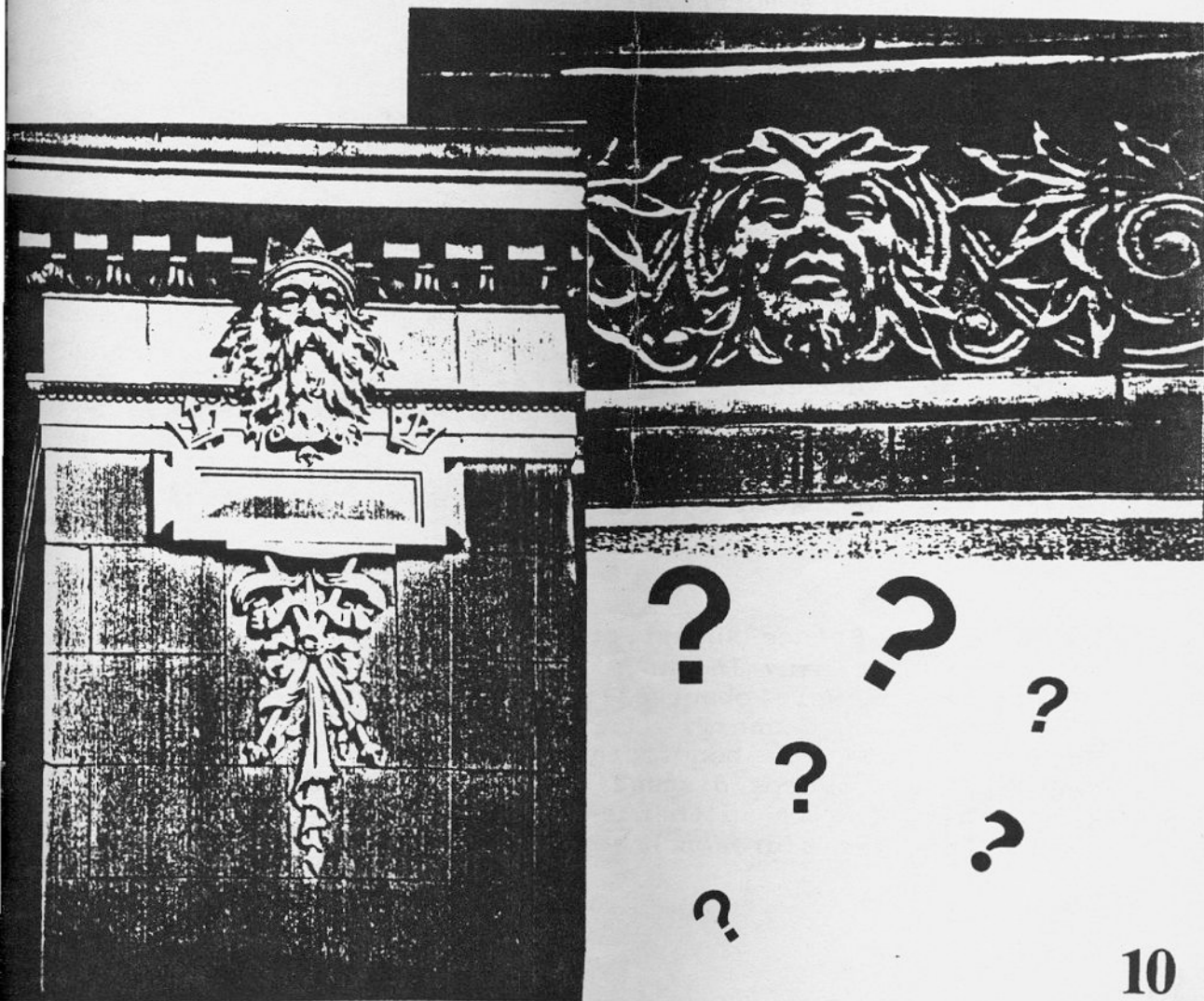
HIDDEN HERITAGE

THE HERITAGE SOCIETY OF B. C. 10TH ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The Hallmark Society sends a member of the Executive each year to attend this conference. The conference was held in Prince Rupert, May 27 - 29.

Representatives from heritage groups throughout B. C. attended--approximately 100 people experienced the hospitality of the citizens of Prince Rupert. The theme of the conference was "Northwest Dreams and Realities." A number of guest speakers from around B. C. and Ottawa presented interesting, thought provoking talks centered around this theme. Terry Reksten's presentation on F. M. Rattenbury's northwest dreams for Prince Rupert was a highlight, as who cannot be intrigued by Terry's colourful eloquence!!

Colin Campbell, Graydon Hayward and Catherine Campbell, all from the Ministry of Tourism, Recreation and Culture addressed "Project Pride." Catherine Campbell will be the program director for "Community Pride", which will address recommendations made in the "Project Pride" Report. "Community Pride" will focus on Regional Workshops, Skills Program Training, Information Kit Mailouts, Promotional Material, Training Opportunities Newsletter, Information Referral Service and Technical Information.

The Heritage Society of B. C. presented their annual awards during the banquet. There were four award categories: 1) Poster 2) Heritage Week 3) Annual Awards of Honour and 4) Special Individual Awards. In the Heritage Week Awards Category, in the Best School Division, South Park School (which was nominated by the Hallmark Society) tied with Braefoot School.

Tours of the Prince Rupert area included a boat tour of the harbour (where many Indian middens and the deserted village of Metlekatla were observed); and a bus tour to a restored fish processing cannery.

The conference was beneficial in allowing members from so many heritage groups discuss their dreams and realities with each other, and learn that everyone has the same hurdles to jump before their dreams become a reality.

Decorative Plaster

I recently had a wonderful time poking through the showroom of Ital Decor Co., 6886 East Hastings Street, Burnaby, B. C. V5B 1T1. Telephone Joe Tinucci at 291-7973. This local company specializes in all kinds of plaster decorations: moldings, fireplaces, ceilings, columns, brackets and ceiling rosettes. The quality is first rate. This is the company that was responsible for the plasterwork in the restorations of both the Orpheum Theatre and the Sinclair Centre in Vancouver. Their prices are extremely reasonable. Rosettes, for example, range in price from \$45 - \$85.

PART II OF RESEARCHING YOUR HOUSE

Provincial Archives

- City directories from 1860 (remembering that the street numbering system changed in 1905).
- Copies of some very old assessments.
- A vast collection of books on B. C. history which must be read on the premises.
- Old newspapers on microfilm.
- Vertical files contain information on individuals, as well as the James Nesbitt series on "Old Families of Victoria." These files are being put on microfilm at this time.
- The Maps and Plans Department contains fire insurance plans (some from 1870's and 1880's) up to the present time, as well as architectural plans indexed by architect's name.
- The Visual Records Department has photographs of families, buildings, streetscapes and reproductions of paintings by local artists.
- Probate records.

Legislative Library in the Legislative Building.

- Contains newspapers from 1900 to the present.

B. C. Government Maps and Air Photo Department (535 Superior Street)

- Aerial photo surveys.

Land Title Office (850 Burdett Avenue)

- Requires time and money to do a title search.

Heritage Conservation Resource Library (333 Quebec Street)

- Contains rudimentary information on architects.
- Books on how to do research, how to identify your style and age of house and how to maintain and restore it.
