# President's Message

This is my last message as President. It is a good time to consider what we have achieved as a society over the past year and to recognize certain goals for the year ahead.

We have survived the Cadillac Fairview wars with our principles intact, our political awareness sharper, and our membership ever-growing. We have resisted the natural temptations to despair, but we have also become less naive.

We have learned the hard way about advocacy. Though we haven't won all the cases we have taken on, we have fought them well, with passion and with facts. We have led in the big struggles, such as the continuing fight over the future of St. Ann's Academy.

And we have tried to show that our causes and our work are positive. We have put our money where our words are, and we have given the kind of help that doesn't get headlines: friendly, knowledgeable advice to everyone from individual members (and non-members) to municipal politicians.

We have put on a bigger and better Awards Night celebration, and, just as important, we have learned more about why we give awards and what the awards mean.

Paul Convey once remarked that one has to be a little masochistic to be President of the Hallmark Society. Unfortunately, Paul said this <u>after I</u> agreed to serve. After a year of it, I think he's right. I can't say that I'm proud of what we have achieved since last September. There have been too many disappointments to permit the false luxury of pride. Politically, we remain in the wasteland; it is hard to find signs of enlightenment and shared purpose among our elected leaders.

Yet my own agenda for the year ahead isn't too dreamy to share with you. I think that we can forge an agreement that will create a downtown commercial heritage restoration fund for Victoria. I think that we can apply enough political pressure to make sure that the downtown heritage inventory

is more than an exercise in guilt-reduction. I think that we can work with our friends in other groups to interpret and present Victoria's architectural heritage more effectively, through walking tours, exhibits, and other events. I know that we can keep a strong voice on heritage advisory committees and in council chambers.



# **Cover Story**

### <u>Sussex Apartment Hotel - Model Solution or Missed</u> <u>Opportunity?</u>

The proposal for an intensive redevelopment of the site of the Sussex Apartment Hotel at Douglas and Broughton Streets, which would involve demolition of one of Victoria's most important commercial art deco buildings, has been withdrawn since the Advisory Planning Commission hearing of July 19th. City planners have been trying to convince the developers to pursue a design plan that would incorporate the existing building, perhaps as the base of their towers--after all, art deco is even fashionable prestigious again. The Hallmark Society will be trying to similar message, also aimed at municipal get across a politicians: greater density of development should be permitted only as a bonus if the developers retain the significant heritage building. The Society will fully and vocally support a design solution which preserves the Sussex in more than a token fashion.



# Heritage Update

### CRD Headquarters - Playing Politics with Old Town

It now seems that the Capital Regional District's concerns about the safety of its Yates Street headquarters, in case of earthquake, may be less urgent than the desire of some members of the CRD Board to move the headquarters out of Victoria. A staff report leaked in mid-July has concluded that it would be less costly for the CRD to make the Yates Street heritage buildings fairly safe than for the CRD to build a new headquarters. The Hallmark Society and City Hall staff agree on the need to proceed cautiously in finding a wise balance between seismic safety and heritage preservation.

### Oak Bay Armada

A July 12th letter from Oak Bay Mayor Susan Brice to Mark Madoff, President of the Hallmark Society, deserves attention, especially from members who live behind the Tweed Curtain. In response to the Society's alarm about the fate of an important Prairie School House at 1423 Hampshire Road, reprieved largely thanks to intervention by Hallmark Society member Robert Patterson, Mayor Brice described Oak Bay Council as "a conscientious guardian of the architectural heritage of our community." This may be news to those residents who have watched parts of that heritage being barged to the Cowichan Valley. Mayor Brice also argues that Oak Bay has managed to carry out significant restoration projects without "the auspices of a heritage designation" and that the Oak Bay Heritage Advisory Committee has been nearly invisible and inaudible because there has been much less development pressure in Oak Bay than in Victoria. Mayor Brice's argument, however, does not speak to what protection the municipality as guardian will give to its "comparatively large portion of....housing stock" which "has some degree of architectural merit" and "might be deemed to be of heritage significance" as development pressures increase. Will the municipality deem properties significant by designating and protecting them? When was the last time it designated a property? Have there been no occasions when it might have done so but failed to? Or will conflicts between heritage and development be solved in fashion by exporting the buildings under dispute?

### THE DOWNTOWN VICTORIA HERITAGE PROJECT 1988

The Downtown Victoria Heritage Project is well underway. The first stage, public input and participation, has now helped to define overall concerns and issues relating to the future of downtown's heritage resources. The Hallmark Society, through its Executive and membership, has provided valuable information and assistance, including a comprehensive public brief addressing the objectives of the project.

The inventory work has been initiated, involving a building-by-building survey of the study area. Previous inventory work is being augmented by updated information, and buildings not previously listed are being identified for

further study.

The focus of the study is to provide the City of Victoria with a workable management plan for the heritage resources of the downtown area. Victoria has a unique stock of heritage buildings, and long range, comprehensive planning is required to ensure their protection and enhancement. To achieve this objective, we invite further public

participation during the course of this project.

A general public meeting was held Wednesday, August 17th at City Hall, where members of the public were invited to make presentations regarding the management plan for downtown Victoria's heritage resources. Approximately 70 people attended, Hallmark Society members forming the majority of the audience.

Steve Barber, the City Heritage Planner, spoke first and introduced Mayor Gretchen Brewin. Colin Campbell, Director of the Heritage Conservation Branch and of B. C. Heritage Trust (who funded the project) spoke next. Alderman Martin Segger introduced Don Luxton and Valda Vidners who spoke on the progress to date. Presentations were made by the following groups:

Mark Madoff - The Hallmark Society

Gary White - The Canadian Art Deco Society Bjorn Simonsen - The Heritage Society of B. C.

Myra Waller - Friends of Victoria Enhancement Society Five members of the audience also expressed their opinions. Don Luxton stated that he and Valda could be reached at their project site office located at 1215 Broad Street and their telephone number is 385-5020.

Further public meetings will be held: 2 in Chinatown, and workshops with downtown building owners will be announced.

### Hallmark Presentation to Downtown Victoria Inventory Team

On July 13th, Hallmark Society President, Mark Madoff, read a brief at a public meeting called by Don Luxton and Valda Vidners, who are conducting the Downtown Heritage Inventory for the City of Victoria.

Here are some highlights from the Society's position paper:

- 1. The City presently has all the powers it needs to protect the significant heritage of downtown Victoria. It has not used those powers, such as the downzoning of the mid-1970's, consistently and effectively. The City should maintain protective zoning for downtown and permit denser development only as a bonus in exchange for heritage preservation.
- 2. The City should designate downtown heritage properties now merely registered.
- 3. Enforcement of seismic safety codes should be reasonable and consistent with heritage preservation.
- Streetscapes, sight lines and important views, such as View Street, should be protected, not just individual heritage buildings.
- 5. The City's advisory committees, especially the Heritage Advisory Committee, must have resources and information and consistency of membership in order to advise Council well on heritage issues. In particular, heritage issues must not be allowed to slip past the HAC's consideration.
- 6. The City must become more active and cordial in promoting heritage preservation among property-owners. It should start by implementing immediately a programme for funding the preservation of heritage commercial buildings.

### Victoria Not Quite Hopeless

During a recent trip to San Francisco, Mark and Pamela Madoff visited the only two Victorian houses (among the City's hundreds and hundreds) open to the public for tours -- the Haas-Lilientahl house and the Whittier mansion. Both were disappointing: Haas-Lilientahl, because so little of the original interior remains intact, and because it wasn't a very exciting interior to begin with; the Whittier, because the California Historical Society has interpreted or preserved it very well. The Society needs a million to stabilize the crumbling sandstone cool \$2 exterior of the mansion which it improperly stripped. Between Craigdarroch, Hatley Park, Point Ellice House and Craigflower Farm, we may have managed some assets better than our sister city with its greater potential.

The CFB Esquimalt Museum and Archives Society recently established its own reference library. The library now houses more than 1,000 volumes arranged by subject classification. Some books date from the 1800's while others are new editions. The majority of the collection deals specifically with naval affairs and local history. An up-to-date record of all accessioned books is kept in the Museum's computer. Files are also maintained according to title and author. This computerized system is an aid to research activities and general inquiries.

### Sooke Regional Museum

An exciting expedition was made to Sidney Inlet on Vancouver Island's west coast by a group from the Sooke Regional Museum, where they reclaimed part of an historical cargo which had lain under the ocean for more than a century.

It was in 1853 that the sailing vessel, Lord Western, left the port of Sooke, bound for San Francisco with a cargo of pilings hand-hewn, squared timbers and salted fish. The ship was lost. Located by a Portland diver in 1957, the wreck site was studied last year by the Underwater Archaeological Society of B. C. and at the time, the pilings were withdrawn to the shore.

Working under a special permit, the Sooke Region Museum Group secured specimens from the logs, lying at the intertidal zones and are currently carefully air-drying them for eventual placement in a museum exhibit.

This historic cargo shipped out by John Muir, and originally destined for San Francisco wharf development was one of the very first exports of forest products to leave this Province.

### Victoria Heritage Advisory Committee

Chairman: David Hambleton; Council Rep.: Ald. Martin Segger The Committee has met regularly during the summer with meetings lasting rarely less than two hours. The following notes indicate a few of the items discussed.

Referred by Council for recommendation

In many instances, these consist of alterations or additions to designated properties and involve discussion of appropriateness of style, material, scale, etc. They include residential and commercial properties and recently the Committee has commented on proposed changes to the Empress Hotel and the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria. Signs and awnings continue to be regular agenda items. Although St. Ann's Academy is under Provincial jurisdiction, the Committee prepared a statement as to the heritage importance of the site.

Requests for Heritage Designation

Requests are received from time to time, usually from owners of houses on the Heritage Register. Merits of structure, location and historic significance are carefully considered before recommendations are made.

### Land-Use Conflicts

If the economy picks up, there may well be an increase in land use conflicts involving heritage structures. One solution appears to be relocation. This may save the structure, but leaves aside the matter of site significance.

Policy

To enable members to pool their insights and convictions, an extra meeting to consider "policy" was held and others are scheduled. Importance of heritage promotion through communication and education has been stressed. Alderman Segger and Steve Barber (the City's Heritage Planner) have met with the Victoria Real Estate Board. The Heritage Planner is now attending the regular monthly meetings of the Victoria Heritage Foundation and the Committee has recommended an amendment to the Bylaw to ensure that one member of the Heritage Advisory Committee shall be a member of the V.H.F.


