The Hallmark Society was founded by individuals with a desire to save an individual building. Over the span of some 17 years, the number of individuals involved in the Hallmark Society has grown to almost 1300. New members have been born, some members have moved, and sadly some members have died.

Yet the Society continues, because of the individuals who continue to care and to be involved. The support that I am receiving from the membership during this transition from Kathleen's term to my own is evidence of the level of involvement and caring of the individuals who make up our Society.

The Hallmark Society will not be invited to renew its lease of space at Richard Carr House and we must search for a "new home". Again the level of involvement of the membership will be tested.

A domicile committee has been organized and given the mandate to pursue the purchase of a suitable property. Ideally this would be a house in need of protection, preservation and restoration, a place that could provide office and meeting space, as well as an area to maintain our archives.

But there is a second aspect to this "search", one that addresses our concern for remembering and honouring the contribution of individuals. When Mark Madoff was President of the Society, he said that he would like to see the creation of an architectural galleria. It would be a place to exhibit either permanent or temporary architectural displays of drawings and artifacts. It is the desire of the Executive that the "new" home of the Hallmark Society might also be the home of a memorial to the involvement and commitment of Mark Madoff.

We are a group of very different individuals from many walks of life that have come together to create something very special. I thank you all for your support and welcome your help and advice in the future.

Many members of the Hallmark Society will have already read or heard about the sudden and untimely death, by heart attack, of Past-President Mark Madoff on September 13, 1990. Around four hundred of Mark's friends and colleagues attended a Memorial Service for him at Royal Roads (Hatley Park) on September 23, three days after the Hallmark Society's Annual General Meeting.

Mark was one of the most articulate and bright spokespersons that Hallmark has ever had. His experience in heritage preservation preceded his involvement with the Society. His first foray into preservation was the "No Assult on Battery" protest, when the quiet historic corner of James Bay (where Mark and his wife Pamela had moved into an 1893 house on Battery Street), was threatened with obtrusive and insensitive development. As a direct result of cooperative neighbourhood protest, the development was halted and most of the homes on the street were designated Heritage.

When ten listed heritage downtown buildings were threatened with demolition by the proposed Eaton's/Cadillac-Fairview shopping mall, Mark joined with several other people in creating and organizing the Save Our City Coalition. Ultimately, over 8,000 people joined the fight to preserve our downtown heritage and prevent the closure of Broad Street. Mark's intelligent arguments were intrumental in City Council reassessing the project and making improvements to it, though regretfully, not insisting the developer submit new, more sensitive plans that would have retained both the buildings and Broad Street.

From Save Our City, Mark was asked to become President of the Hallmark Society. Mark was both President and spokesman for two years, from 1987 to 1989, and saw membership climb from about 500 to over 1000 people in that time. After Kathleen O'Neill -White took over the Presidency, Mark agreed to continue as spokesaman, a position he held until his death.



Mark's philosophy of caring about his community was all important. He never looked for personal gain in his preservation projects, but rather the ultimate benefit of a more beautiful and civilized city. Other Hallmark members who worked with Mark know of his unfailing support of the Society, whether writing letters, appearing at public meetings, applying for grants or just patiently answering phone calls, Mark always represented the Society in a thoroughly professional manner, which reflects well on the nearly 1300 members.

The Hallmark Society is the richer for Mark Madoff, and the poorer for losing him. He would encourage us all to continue the fight. Godspeed.

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COVER STORY:




William D'Oyly Rochfort was born in Southsea, England in 1884 and was educated in England and the U.S.A. where he trained as newspaper artist and reporter. He moved to B.C. in 1904 and served with the 5th Regiment. During this time he articled for three years in Samuel Maclure's architectural practice. From 1908 until his architectural career was interrupted by WW I, Rochfort designed a number of both residential and commercial buildings. His residential commissions in particular showed a debt to Maclure's influence. Many of the homes were designed in the Tudor Revival style that is so closely identified with Maclure.

In some cases, such as the large half-timbered house at 1989 Cresent Road, built at the foot of King George Terrace in 1908, credit for its design has been mistakenly attributed to Maclure. Another prominent example of Rochfort's adeptness in the Tudor Revival style is the Dr. Sigfried Hartman house at 1009 Cook (at Rockland). Its half-timbering, fine bevelled glass and massive stone piers make it an appropriate landmark marking the entrance to the Rockland residential area. The A.C. Moorhead home, also build in the Tudor Revival style, was a significant element in the Beach Drive/Prospect Place neighbourhood. At least it was until it was slated for demolition and made headlines as it was saved by being moved by barge to Yellowpoint a few years ago.

In 1912 he designed the clubhouse for the Royal Victoria Yacht Club. Although its facade has been altered by unsympathetic additions in 1965 and 1983, which included the filling in of its spacious verandahs, glimpses of its Edwardian classical revival lines can still be seen. Rochfort also designed the previous clubhouse, a picturesque building which sat on pilings in the inner harbour.





Rochfort's most ambitious commission was the design for the Royal Victoria Theatre which was done in collaboration with his partner, Mr. E. W. Sankey and completed in 1913 at a cost of \$400,000.00. The firm spent over a year on its designs and supplied 805 working drawings. It was heralded, by the local press of the time, as the handsomest and most up-to-date theatre on the American continent. The balcony and ground floor plans replicated the main parts of the Orpheum Theatre in Seattle. The interior plasterwork, done in the style of Louis XVI, was designed by Mr. Sankey and fabricated by craftsmen working on site. The ceilings and walls featured oil on canvas murals which were covered with paint and wallpaper when the building was converted to a motion picture theatre in 1946. Perhaps at some future date these murals, which were the pride of the developers, will be uncovered and restored.

Rochfort went overseas during WW I and although he returned to Victoria for a time, there is no record of him resuming his architectural practice. He subsequently lived in England and the U.S.A. and appears to have returned to work as a newspaper illustrator.

HERITAGE UPDATE



Victoria City Hall Tower - The original colour scheme has been determined by paint analyses. Financial contraints seem, at the moment, to be causing a compromise between restoration and maintenance. The project will be followed with keen interest as it is a nationally historic site.

1248 Burnside Road West - is an early 1930's cottage, designed by Herbert Savage, and sits on a pristine seven hectares of land at the base of Knockan Hill Park in Saanich. Saanich Parks and Recreation want to demolish the house and blast rock to provide parking for visitors. This would result in not only the destruction of a lovely period building, but the desecration of the gardens, rockery, several aged and unique trees, rare plants, and the memory of a pioneer who donated the land to Saanich as a place for people to wonder in nature.

RECENT BRITISH COLUMBIA HERITAGE TRUST GRANTS

Grants awarded in October to organizations in the area.

Hook Sin Tong Building - on Herald Street for restoration - \$54,000.

B.C. Historical Federation - Gulf Islands Branch - for two historical plaques. These are part of an ongoing project to put plaques on each Gulf Island. One plaque will be placed in Bedwell Harbour on South Pender Island, to mark the first hydrographic survey bench mark on the west coast, placed there by the HMS Egeria, an early survey vessel. The other plaque will be placed on the site of the first public school on Saturna Island. - \$700.



VICTORIA HERITAGE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Steve Barber, Heritage Planner for the City of Victoria, recieved an invitation from the Hon. Marcel Masse, Federal Minister of Communication, to attend a conference in Edmonton, Alberta, October 25-27. The conference was entitled "Heritage in the 1990's - Towards a Government of Canada Strategy." There will be a workshop on November 30 and December 1 for members of the VHAC, the Victoria Heritage Foundation and the Downtown Heritage Building Incentive Subcommittee. The workshop will be held under the auspices of Community Pride. Special meetings were held on October 16-18 for the 85 downtown property owners of buildings slated for heritage registry. While there was not a 100% turnout, it was felt that the meetings were a valuable start to the information process. Enough interest was shown to indicate that further meetings could be usefully held at a later date.

ESQUIMALT HERITAGE PRIDE ASSOCIATION

The Association will be managing Heritage Month for Esquimalt in 1991. The Canadian Forces Base, the Municipality and the Municipal Archives are all being asked for assistance. The Heritage Trust will be asked for a grant to update the inventory of heritage homes in Esquimalt.

CANADIANA COSTUME MUSEUM AND ARCHIVES OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

FEDERAL HERITAGE POLICY REVIEW CONFERENCE

The Hallmark Society was asked to send a representative to a Federal Heritage Policy Review Conference held in Edmonton from October 25-28, 1990. Stuart Stark, a past president of Hallmark represented the Society at this Meeting which was intended to gather opinion from across the country to generate new federal heritage legislation. Prior to the Conference, an extraordinary meeting of Hallmark past-presidents was held to use the Society's seventeen years of heritage experience, to contribute Hallmark's viewpoint effectively. Three of the many points made were: 1.) the need for a National Historic Trust to own historic property in Canada; 2.) the need for greater communication between Federal government departments so one department isn't destroying what another department deems to be heritage; and 3.) a national registry of historic buildings and sites which could add effective protection to any existing building at the municipal level. The Society will be sending a further written report as a follow-up to the presentations Stuart Stark made at the Conference.
