THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS of Heritage Canada met in Whitehorse and Dawson City between May 28 and June 2nd. It was very interesting to note that since the federal government began the restoration of 19 buildings in Dawson City, the tourist in-flow to that remote but fascinating area has jumped from 4,000 a summer to 40,000 over the last five years. With a new road under construction from

Skagway, due to be completed in 1977, the Yukon will soon rival southern B.C. as a tourist attraction, NOT, dear Chamber of Commerce because of the nightlife in Dawson City, but because of their HISTORIC BUILDINGS.
