MAIN ACTIVITES

Muirhead House - after a long period of various groups showing interest, the owner agreed to give us thirty days to find a way of saving the Muirhead House. The then Minister of Public Works, Bill Hartley, agreed to seriously consider moving the house to the Legislative Precinct, with the owner's deadline for the decision December 12, one day after the provincial election. The rest is history and the house has now been demolished. In the two weeks before December 12, Garth Mayhew acted as caretaker to make sure the house was safeguarded while a decision was being awaited. With no heat and no light, he stayed overnight and we are all grateful to Garth for his undertaking, which is certainly above and beyond the call of duty. Andy Barker also helped to caretake and we send our hearty thanks to you two devoted members. The Muirhead House is a good example of a building which could have been saved, had we had the necessary funds available. Apparently there is no problem in the actual moving of a building of even this size.

Crotty Residence - this is the important Maclure-designed building at 821 Burdett. At this time, Oscar Gislason of Sealand House Moving is working out details for moving the house to property in Sooke. The former owner, Dabney Turner, was horrified when she heard the house was to be destroyed and did everything she could. Although relocation to Sooke is not the ideal solution, it is better than being crushed to rubble. The floor plans and details of this building have been recorded by Martin Segger and the Provincial Museum staff.

Community Services Fair - we participated with setting up a display, manned by Isla Tuck, Barbara Watkins and Catherine Hodgens. Apart from the good publicity, we gained a few new members.

Publicity - our "public image" determines how successful we are in creating public awareness for heritage preservation. Terry Reksten has been on "Barton & Co.," on Channel 6 five times; on Joe Easingwood's phone-in radio show over CJVI twice; has had extensive coverage in "Monday" (unfortunately now defunct); has prepared press releases for the Annual Awards; handled the large amount of media coverage of the Crotty Residence dilemma~ was appointed to the Victoria Heritage Advisory Committee.
