ANNUAL REPORT 1976-77

The highlight of the past year undoubtedly was the "New Life for REPORT Old Buildings" Conference held in Vancouver in February. The 1976-77 Hallmark Society was one of the five sponsoring groups for this first-ever B. C.-Yukon heritage conference and it is with pride we note that 11 out of 49 of the conference speakers or moderators were Hallmark members. It was excellent representation of our knowledgeable membership which now numbers over 235. Probably our most visible undertaking was our campaign to save the Jones Building. Starting in January when your executive first became aware of the building's change of ownership and the intention of demolition, every possible means at our disposal was used to urge the Royal Bank and City Council to restore the building as part of the new development. The Royal Bank's attitude never veered from their original intentions, even with the welcome additional support of the Fairfield Community Association, the Fernwood Community Association, the James Bay Residents' League and the Downtown Blanshard Association. Dozens of letter, public meetings, Norm Pearson's well-researched handbill, radio and T.V. publicity, as well as architectural rendering showing in a positive way the Jones Building could be incorporated into a new development were all methods of protest. We have reliable information that the run of withdrawals of accounts potting the demolition was heavy (did you withdraw yours?), yet as oh read this, Samuel Maclure's rare commercial building will be rubble. The finely detailed exterior, as well s the hight interior plaster ceilings and tile and marble hallways and office with fireplaces (some behind newer finishes) made this a uniquely west coast building typical of the prosperity of 1912. It will never be seen again. We now can be sure that both City Council and the Royal Bank will think twice before allowing further demolition of heritage buildings. On a much more positive note, although certainly of a quieter nature, it was wonderful news to receive \$43,000 from the Canada Works program to hire six people to

complete the Hallmark Society's inventory of heritage buildings in the Capital Region. Excellent photographs, with complete and detailed histories of each building are being completed and we hope to publish the results in late spring 1978. The Inventory Committee is being ably coordinated by Margaret Hutchison and Ben Manning. That grant is for wages and materials for the inventory only. The day-to-day running of the society still depends on membership dues, sale of hasti-notes, prints etc. So we were especially pleased with the results of our two bazaars, held at HillSide Shopping Centre in October and April, as they brought in \$411.62. Thanks again to all the volunteers and coordinators Isla Tuck and Margaret Hutchison. Other highlights of the Hallmark year included:

- Hampton Court Apartments (1908?) Cook Street. Saved: Purchased by Mr. Elworthy for upgrading and preservation.
- Hallmark Society Heritage Preservation Awards Night, February 23, 1977 at Jim Lee's house. A great party! (as usual)
- The Life (and loves) of architect F. M. Rattenbury March 23, 1977 saw a large crowd attend Terry Reksten's fascinating illustrated lecture
- A sequel in Our Great Architects series was presented by Al Kerr on Percy Leonard James, April 27 1977.
- Cresta Linda (Fort and Linden) and 1040-42 Linden Avenue. Demolished.
- Hosted Vancouver Historical Society Bus Tour. May 7, 1977 •
- Walking Tours of Old Town. June 8, 1977.
- The Crystal Gardens--West Coast Pleasure Palace book published and on sale for \$7.95 and \$40.00.

- Jones Building (1912). Demolished.
