The Anglican Synod of the Diocese of British Columbia reacted strongly to the idea of having the two oldest churches in Saanich designated 'Heritage". Thee are St. Michael and All Angels, Royal Oak, and St. Columba's Strawberry Vale (the latter does not happen to be in Saanich, as the Saanich Heritage Advisory Committee found, to their embarrassment!) But the Synod missed St. Lukes! These buildings are amongst the oldest institutional buildings still in continual use in the area, representing part of the heritage fabric.
