

The saving of this house happened only because countless hours of time were spent by Foundation Trustees writing letters, making phone calls, attending meetings and doing plain old leg work. Although we may not be thanking him six months from now, we must give credit to one of our members, Doug Berry, for letting us know that the house was available. Working against a demo- lition freeze deadline of March 3rd, the biggest problem was to find a suitable new site for the house. (The problem of having no funds to buy a lot if we did find one was safely put away in the dark recesses of our minds.) After searching for

suitable sites, it became evident that the best site - if not the only site - was a parking lot on Parry Street used by government employees. John Keay tackled what almost turned out to be an insurmountable obstacle - getting~ a commitment from someone out of four or five agencies involved in government parking lots to consider our acquisition of the lot.

Russ Irvine, Director of the Heritage Conservation Branch and Executive Director of the B. C. Heritage Trust had given us support from the beginning. at this point he became directly involved in our cause and did a fantastic job in obtaining the support of the Minister responsible, the Hon. Evan Wolfe, arranging meetings of all concerned, and coming up with a proposal satisfactory to everyone. Through his efforts and those of Mike Young and Martin Segger of the B. C. Heritage Trust, the Trust at its February 29 meeting agreed to cover the cost of moving the house (\$25,000) and buying the lot from BCBC (about \$35.000). This will give us time (six months from the time of resiting, approximately September 30, 1980) to raise the \$60,000 to buy the house and property from the Trust on a first refusal basis.

Each of the Trustees has devoted a great amount of time to get the project to this stage. Now it is up to you, the Society members, to actively support the Fundraising Drive.

Three committees have been struck and all need help. They are:

TECHNICAL COMMITTEE John Keay: chairman. Primarily involved with the practical considerations of moving the house and putting suites in both the basement and the attic to provide revenue.

RESTORATION COMMITTEE Stuart Stark: chairman. Working closely with the Technical Committee, the Rest- oration Committee is concerned with restoring the 1901 appearance of the house, exterior and Main Floor. This will involve research for accurate results.

FINANCE FUND-RAISING COMMITTEE Jim Lee: chairman Our most important committee will be responsible to raise money, secure grant support and other finances. It will also keep a tight reign on expenditures -to keep the entire project viable.

PUBLICITY / INFORMATION COMMITTEE No chairperson yet. To work closely with the Finance Committee and the press. We need some imaginative people to help here.

THE JACKSON HOUSE - A brief history Built in the summer of 1901, this house was owned by Mary Ann E. Jackson, wife of Richard Jackson, a manager of the Insurance Division of the B. C. Land and Investment Co. Both Jacksons were members of pioneer Victoria families. Richard's parents, Dr. and Mrs. William Jackson came to Victoria around Cape Horn in 1863. Mary Ann's parents were Mr. and Mrs. William White. Richard and Mary Ann lived at 522 Simcoe Street for five years. When they sold the house, it was altered (probably in the 'teens) to provide more accommodation in the attic. At some point the front verandah was boxed in and the front hall extended onto the porch as well. Today, though neglected, the house is sound and has several fine interior features, including a

double parlour/dining room with sliding doors. Each of the main rooms features a wide bay window, and nearly all mouldings are intact. The exterior detailing is quite special and unlike any other house in Victoria. It will be especially attractive when painted as it was in the summer of 1901.
