JACKSON HOUSE Financial arrangements for the JACKSON HOUSE are now complete--details in the next newsletter. Plaster demolition should be accomplished by the time you get this, and there will be ameeting for volunteers on Saturday, March 21st at 11 a.m. at the Jackson House. Mr. Fred Hiigli, who is acting as general contractor for the renovations, will be on hand. If you can paint, do clean up. landscape, garden, build a fence, strip (paint!), or whatever, please come to the Jackson House, Parry & Michigan, on Saturday. Many hands make a big job small!

Apologies to volunteers who showed up for plaster removal, only to find the bin hadn't arrived on time. Thanks to Ron Waugh for cleaning and re-hanging Jackson House sign. Old wallpaper samples have been taken from each room and matted so there is a comclete record of wallpapers, enough for History Division at Provincial Museum, and for our files.

24 DOUGLAS STREET Some of you may recognize this as the house in the Mile "0" block of the Trans Canada Highway. The Hallmark Society has requested listing of this house because of a land assembly scheme happening in that block. The house was featured in the NATIONAL BUILDER'S magazine of December 1915, and is significant in that it is an intact example of the West Coast vernacular style at the West end of the Trans Canada.

HERITAGE IN CRD A letter from Ms. Lleanne Epp, Planning Assistant at the Capital Regional District, informs us that while the department has a keen interest in promoting heritage conservation, they have no power to make legal designations, until and unless the Heritage Conservation Act is reworded. Even if they could designate, they couldn't assist financially, as a Regional District has no power to levy taxes (after the latest budget, I'm sure you're all saying, "Whew!"). To further complicate matters, the Department of Highways has power of approval on subdivision applications.

At any rate, they do have a good collection of photographs of potential heritage buildings in the Western Communities, and could make available to us a brief history of same. Stuart Stark has the Community Planning Department staff reports Lleanne sent, if anyone would like to read them.

ESQUIMALT RESEARCH

WILSON HOUSE Approval was given by the Heritage Advisory Committee to plans to build four townhouses attached to, but behind, the main house, with a separate driveway lower than the rest of the property, and fronting on St. Charles Street. Construction required to be of similar material.
