APRIL-MAY NEWSLETTER

JACKSON This project is running ahead of schedule and the results are HOUSE gratifying. The front dormer was removed and the porch opened (Parry St.)UP, revealing 31/0f the original turned posts, with the missing one to be reproduced. Windows are being made for downstairs, and the back emergency stairs to the top floor have been fitted inside the house. Plumbing and electrical work are virtually complete. A telephone and sink are in place in our Society meeting room, and it will be good to have even a small horne of our own.

We were most fortunate to receive a donation of a beautiful, turn-of-the-century front door. The pediment with acorn detailing is a perfect match for other acorn details on the house, and the obscure glass and unusual brass doorknob and backplate make this a particularly fitting contribution. Many thanks, to David Soltonovich.

There is an immediate need for \$5,000 to \$7,000 in additional funds to complete the Jackson Rouse renovations. Rumour has it that the Trutch House is for sale in the \$200,000 neighbourhood. The other houses which were to be included in the redevelopment are also thought to be on the block.

IS NOTHING SACRED? Beware of thieves who would steal the very hardware off your front door! That is what happened to a resident of Rockland Avenue, the former happy owner of an ornate backplate assembly, who found it neatly removed one fine Saturday morning within the space of half an hour! This is a large (29" X 5"~) brass backplate with cast fleur-de-lis at top and bottom and standard thumblatch. If you should see such an item anywhere, please get in touch with the police or the Hallmark Society, and possibly we can assist the owner in the return of his property.

Take note that this is an item which may not be covered by your homeowner's insurance, unless you happen to have an all-risk type policy. If you have such valuables attached to the outside of your home, you might check with your insurance agent as to whether theft of same would be covered by your policy.

GODFELT PROPERTY The owner of Roslyn, Mr. Paul Condon, has asked our assistance in maintaining the status quo in his neighbourhood. The City of Victoria, owner of the Godfelt property on which stands Maplewood, is hoping to sell this large chunk of the Catherine Street spine to developers. The idea appears to be to fit in five or so new duplexes around Maplewood. Homeowners inthe area have banded together to try to prevent such inappropriate "improvement" in this historically significant section of Vic West. They have submitted some alternate proposals, such as moVing in old homes scheduled for demolition in other areas of the city.

Please support the efforts of the Vic West residents in maintaining the integrity of this charming neighbourhood, where so much good work has already been done.

24 DOUGLAS STREET We are trying to save this hOuse at Mile "O" on the Trans Canada. It was designed by Jud Yoho, a well-known Seattle architect of the period. He edited a magazine called THE BUNGALOW, which was quite popular from 1913-15 and we are attempting to obtain a copy of a thesis recently written by a Seattle student on Mr. Yoho's career. The house, untouched since it was built in 1915, may have to be moved because of land assembly scheme. Even the unique granite and chain fence remains intact. Incidentally, there is a mirror image of the house right behind 24 Douglas.

FERNWOOD PRESSURE
